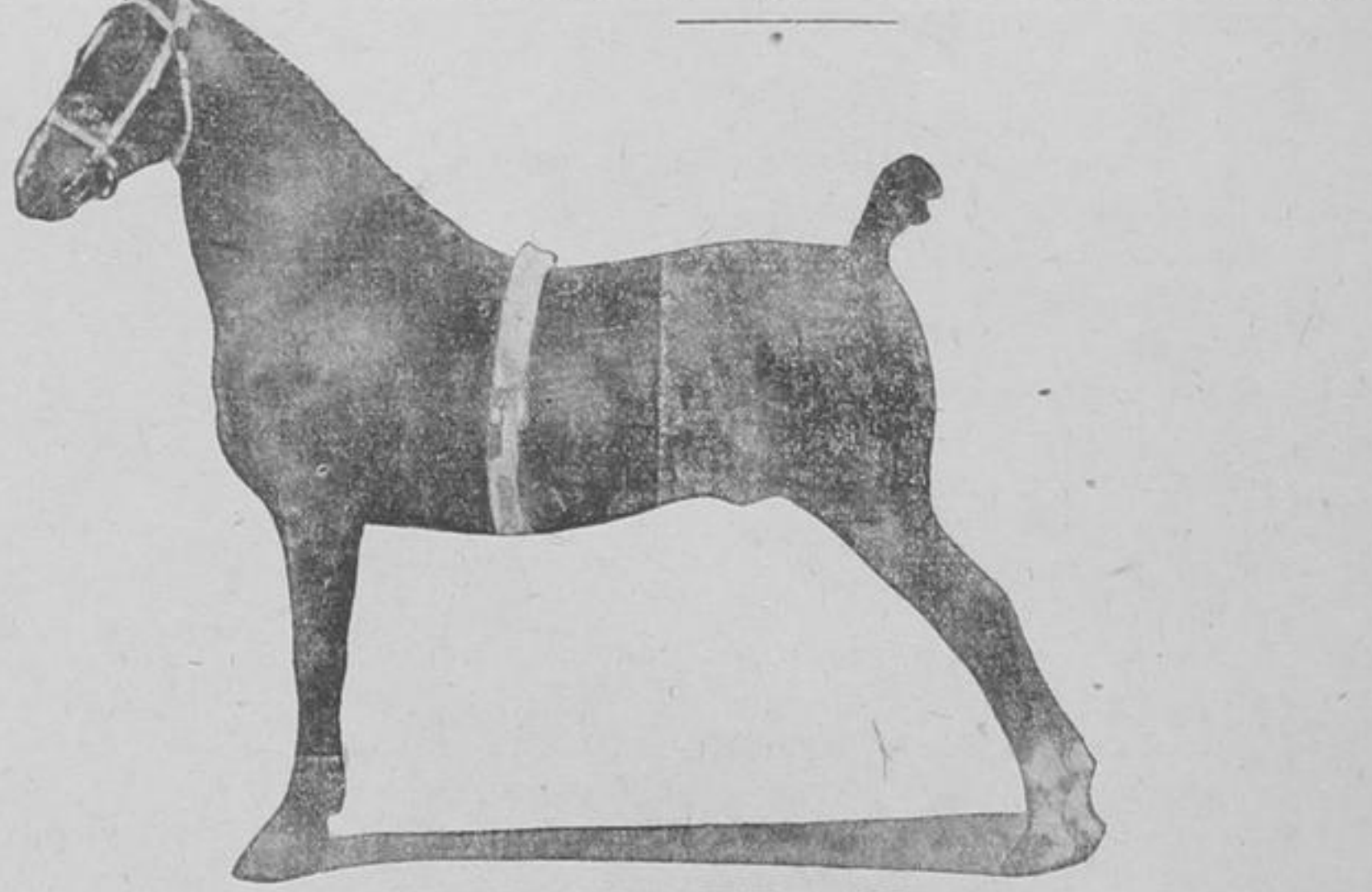
Mrs. W. Elliott is spending a few days in Toronto this week.
