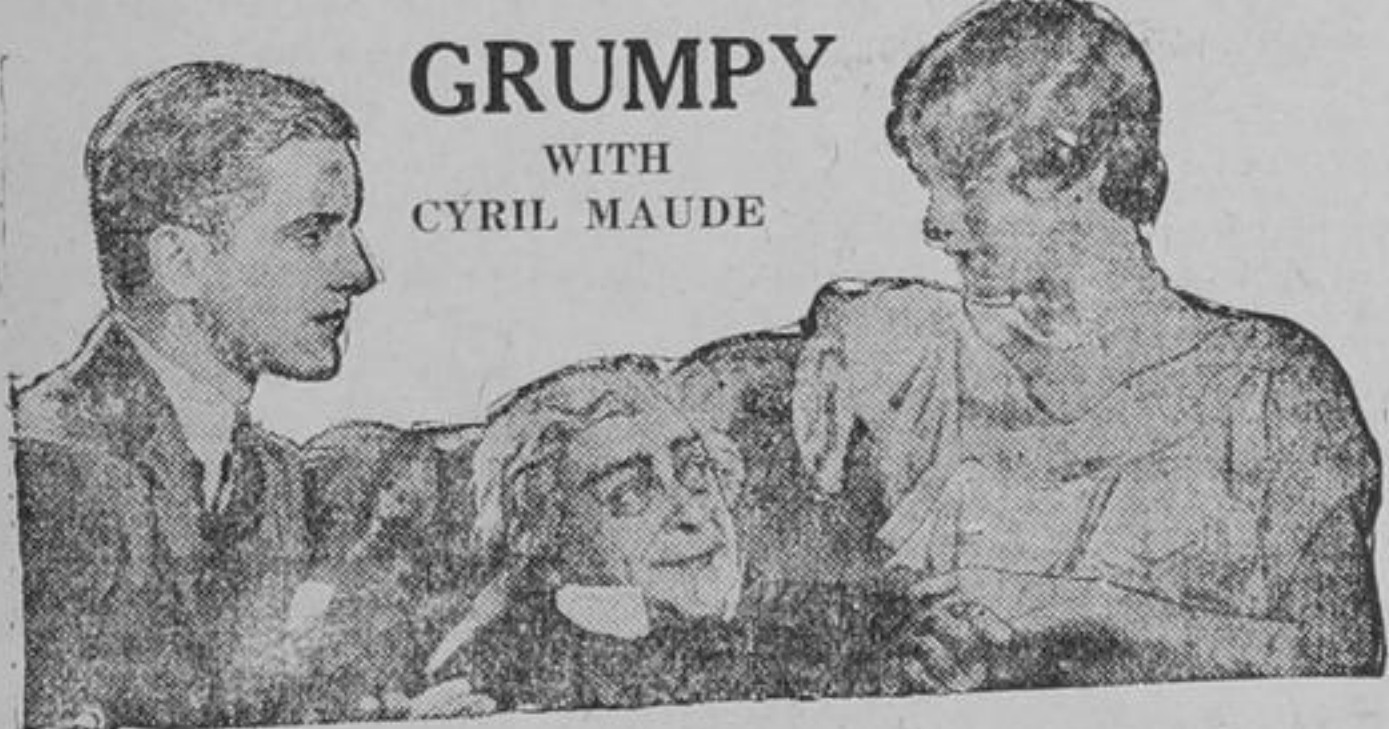

CONTEST DRAWS WIDE VARIETY OF ENTRIES - SHOW FLOWERS, FRUIT

The Richmond Hill Horticultural Society held its seventeenth annual Fall Flower show in the Arena last Saturday afternoon and evening.

The hall looked beautiful under the direction of Mr. Angle, the head of the decoration committee. It was hung all around with streamers of red white and blue, while pots of ferns formed the background for the exhibits. Two large palms loaned by Mr. Dunlop graced the southeast corner where ice cream and cake were served. And the tables were never placed more advantageously for display.

What a long dry summer it has been yet no indication of the condition appeared at the show. The vegetables were good quality except cabbages and cauliflowers which were small. But four splendid collections were staged. Potatoes, tomatoes, carrots, etc., were present in quantities. And the juvenile exhibit was equal to the best of former years.

In the flowers Mr. George Topper's exhibit in the professional class added greatly to the show. It occupied a table in the centre and the huge baskets of asters, zinnias and other flowers were very attractive. The aster section was scant as compared with former years, while dahlias were conspicuous by their absence, there being only two at the exhibition. The exhibits in table and stick room bouquets were as usual many and varied and contributed to the interest of visitors. Conspicuous were Mr. H. D. Bennett's basket of small yellow flowers shading to deeper tones and Mr. C. H. Sanderson's dainty bowls of gypsophila with rose and pink coloured blooms.

The society may congratulate itself on the success of the show.

What Is Certified Milk?

As Defined by
DR. HENRY L. COIT

Founder of the Medical Milk Commission

CERTIFIED MILK is a product of dairies operated under the direction of a Medical Milk Commission, which body is appointed for voluntary service by a medical society. The milk is designed to fulfill standards of quality, purity and safety to insure its adaptability for clinical purposes and the feeding of infants.

The certificate of the Commission constitutes its authorization for the use of the term "Certified." The certification is based upon the fulfillment of prescribed medical requirements for the milk and is the guarantee that it conforms to definite standards and to fixed methods and regulations for its production.

The standards of quality consist of fresh, whole milk, unchanged by heat or cold, less than twenty-four hours old when sold, held between the temperatures of 48 and 50 degrees Fahrenheit, with not less than 12 per cent. of total solids, with fat content between 3.5 and 5.5 per cent. and without the addition of any other substance, material, chemical or preservative.

The standards of purity for the milk consist of the entire absence of particles of foreign matter, of the lowest possible bacterial and dust dropping content consistent with the highest possible practice of dairy hygiene, provided that the numerical bacterial contamination is at all times below an average weekly count of 10,000 per cubic centimeter.

The standards of safety consist in the use of every known means to exclude from the milk pathogenic micro-organisms, a medical guarantee that every employee handling the milk is free from disease and is not a disease carrier, and a veterinary guarantee that the cattle are in perfect health and cannot transmit through the milk any bovine affection.

The methods and regulations for the production of Certified milk are based upon the most advanced clinical requirements, prophylactic science and dairy husbandry and are changed as the action of the Commission modifies its technique for the attainment of its standards.
