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GENERA NEWS AND VIEWS

Richmond Hill will remain the terminal of the North Yonge Railway. This week the time allowed the northern municipalities to purchase the line north of here expired and the city of Toronto will immediately commence a disposal of the assets which will be sold as scrap.

It would be interesting to know how much the City will realize from this method of disposal in view of the large price asked the northern municipalities.

According to the reliable reports the North Yonge Railway to Richmond Hill is enjoying a generous patronage and promises to give a very satisfactory report at the end of the first year. The service is good and the people are well satisfied with their own railway.

The Pupils of Principal Scott's class enjoyed a corn roast at Boyle's Pond on Monday evening.

The annual North Ontario County Plowing Match will be held on the farm of John St. John just east of Uxbridge on Friday, October 10th.

At a recent sale of farm stock and implements held at the farm of F. Timbers, Markham township, milk cows sold as high as \$150.28 cows sold at an average price of \$108.50.

During the electrical storm early Sunday morning the radio pole at the home of W. Heron, Richvale, was struck by lightning. The bolt came down the connecting wire and tore a good sized board off the side of the house. The radio was disconnected and no other damage was done.

During the same storm a large tree near the home of Mr. Thomas Moore, South Yonge Street, was struck and splintered.

Officers of the Toronto District Branches of the Canadian Legion held their annual stag party at the home of Major W. J. Morrison of Langstaff, Saturday. Football, baseball and horseshoe pitching contests featured the day's entertainment. Credit for the success of the party was given to Major W. J. Morrison and Capt. C. Nash, of Toronto, who have worked hard on the preparations for the past week. About 150 attended.

Here is an idea for the Town Council to consider. For the last six years several streets in Woodstock have been paved with a mixture of asphalt and crushed stone called amiesite. It was laid by local men and the cost is small compared with regular pavements. Figured on a 15 year basis the cost is less than half paid for street oiling and is as free from dust as the ordinary pavements. It is worth investigating.

Beeton council has struck the tax rate at 41.4 mills, 1 8-10 mills higher than last year.

Bradford high school opened with 104 pupils last week, while the public school had 126.

In Midland a street carnival conducted by the Kiwanians netted \$1800. The money will be used for underprivileged children.

Thieves entered the barber shop of Harry Sheardown at Bolton, and made off with several razors and hair clippers. The same night they visited the office of F. E. Snider and took his fountain pen, some stamps and a number of bank forms.

Aurora started work on a new skating rink this week, the cost of which is estimated at \$15,000.

According to police, Masters was travelling north on Yonge Street when something went wrong with the steering gear. The car skipped, finally landing against a telephone pole.

Arthur Breedon, of King, reports a yield of fifty bushels of alfalfa from seven acres.

Next year's license color scheme is to be somewhat changed. After having black lettering on a white background or vice versa for such a number of years, black lettering on an old background will give a more snappy appearance. Sample plates have already been stamped and on them, "Ont. 1931" will appear at the top of the marker instead of at the bottom as in former years. The bolt holes will be made at the top of the plate.

With the deer hunting season not far distant, hunters are no doubt making plans for the Northern visit. Among numerous things they should take with them is one little thought—"make sure it is deer before you shoot." Only last week a thirteen-year old boy shot his father when he mistook him for a moose while hunting with an Indian guide on the Albany river in the Soo district. The father, Gordon Crowle, aged 40 of Oban near Sault Ste. Marie, died at Horne-payne hospital the following day from a bullet wound in the head.
