Woodbridge Fair on Friday and Saturday of this week.

With the close of the tourist season Orillia's municipal motor camp will be free from debt, and will have paid not only the cost of operation but for all improvements made the past season. Starting with a \$455 deficit from last year the entire debt has been wiped off. A total of 2,068 parties visited the camp during the year, almost double that of 1929.

Two barns on neighboring farms about seven miles south-west of Collingwood were destroyed by fire last week, along with the season's crop. Believed to have originated from spontaneous combustion, fire gutted the barn of Mrs. Thomas Bullock and a strong wind carried the sparks to the barn of Samuel McLeod nearby, which was also destroyed.

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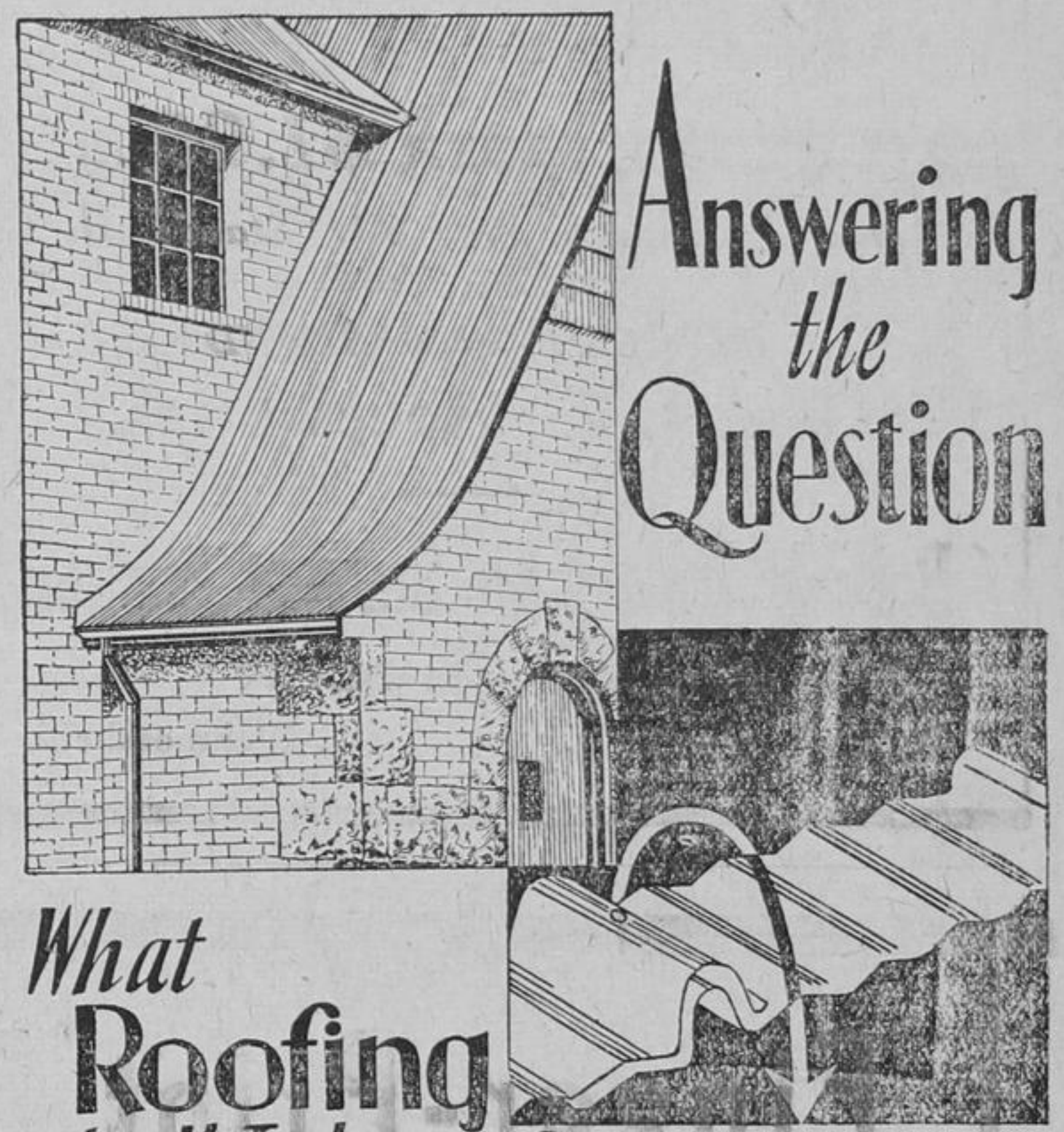
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
