GENERAL NEWS AND VIEWS

The purchasing of the old Metropolitan car line from Eagle to Yonge Street to make a new approach to the town of Newmarket, was under discussion at the last meeting of Newmarket council.

Edward Stubbs, of Orillia, has a sunflower that measures 18 inches in diameter and is nearly 11 feet in height. He says this is the largest he has ever seen.

Newmarket night watchman reported ten tramps housed over-night during September.

The report of the Barrie Chief of Police for September showed 60 cases handled and fines totalling \$456.00. June receipts were \$780.; July \$552.; August \$713.00.

Can a rooster live on salt for four weeks? G. S. Wice, of Thornton, has one that did! A month ago the hens on the Wice farm were rounded up for the night and one rooster was missing. After several days it was believed he had been stolen, and he was forgotten.

On October 6, just four weeks from the time he disappeared, Mr. Wice found the "stolen" bird in the salt barrel in his drive shed. He had weighed 11 pounds before his incarceration, but when found he tipped the scales at only four and a half pounds. When released the rooster looked as though he had been plucked, only a few scraggy feathers remained. It is believed the rooster flew to the barrel top, which tipped, dropping and locking him in the barrel.

Up to August there were 674 receiving Old Age Pensions in Ontario County. At the last meeting of the Board the name of Mrs. McCraden, of Rama was added. Mrs. McCraden is 98 years old and her daughter aged 71 years is also receiving the pension in the same County.

Richard Bentham, of Flesherton, has reached the heights of economy and is fully convinced farming is a prosperous business if carried on in the right manner. He is the owner of a binder which has just reaped its forty fifth crop. The original canvases are still in use and very little replacement of parts has been required. The secret of the long life of the machine, claims the Flesherton Advance, is the storing in a shed immediately after use and the constant oiling and general care. It has proven many times, says the newspaper, that the care of machinery pays a high dividend, and a heavy drain on the bank balance is thereby eliminated. And why shouldn't it be?

On account of the large number of fires caused by threshing it is reported that at the next session of the Legislature a bill will be introduced repealing the present Steam Threshing Engines Act and bringing in a more effective Act as a protection against fires from this cause.

Among the relics of pioneer days exhibited at Bolton Fair was a charcoal smoothing iron said to be 125 years old and used by Mrs. Fox, of Muddy York (now Toronto); a cast iron kettle, used as a bread pan by Mrs. James McAllister, of lot 31, con. 11, Vaughan, about the year 1840, brought from Scotland; deed from the Crown to Joseph Kerr, dated Nov. 20, 1821, for a farm now owned by A. S. Rutherford, Albion. First prize went to a "Location Ticket" dated June 23, 1824, granted to William Downey, of Albion, 100 acres, east half lot 18, con. 8, Albion. William Downey, according to records, was the first white man to stay overnight in the Township of Albion. This was in 1818. At his death this property passed to Henry Downey, later to David H. Downey, and is now owned by Wilton E. Downey.
