LATE REV. R. S. FRALICK

Rev. R. S. Fralick, a former pastor of the United Church here, died at his late residence, 23 Lanark Ave., on Saturday, October 25th in his 66th year. A private service at the residence was in charge of Rev. A. J. Carseaden, Minister of Parliament St. United Church. At the church, the service was conducted by the President of the Toronto Conference, Rev. J. J. Coulter, assisted by Rev. G. E. Forbes of Weston United Church and Rev. Dr. Thomas Powell of Calgary, superintendent of Missions in Southern Alberta.

Floral tributes testified to the goodwill of the several churches which Mr. Fralick had served during his 33 years ministry; neighbouring churches of the city, and members, and officials and organizations of Oakwood United Church, of which he was pastor. He is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Mary Frail; one son, Dr. Frank Fralick, of Kitchener, and two daughters, Misses Marjorie and Grace at home.

The pall-bearers were elders of Oakwood United Church. Since Mr. Fralick's pastorate at Oakwood United the Church has advanced materially and rebuilding operations have been carried on. Mr. Fralick had served postorial charges at Windermere, Minnesing, Balsam, Queensville, Ravenna, Victoria Harbor, Scarborough, Thornhill and latterly Oakwood United. Interment was made at Prospect Cemetery.

WHAT WE KNOW ABOUT FARMING

To make certain of a good potato bug yield it is well that the use of paris green be deferred until late in July or early in August, when the vines are well stripped, less paris green will do. It is best when harvesting such a delicious fruit as the pumpkin to send a small boy up the tree and knock them off with a stick, as if left till the fruit drops off it is over ripe and will not winter as well. Stakes should be driven along turnip rows about two feet apart so that the vines can climb. By this method a better quality of turnip is assured. Be sure to leave your implements in the field where you last used them. By attending to this plan manufacturers prosper, and what is needed is prosperity among manufacturers. Farm gates held up with brace chains or barbed wire will not swing but have to be carried round in order to open them each time you pass through and have little regard for time, energy, or patience. Do not fail in this particular.



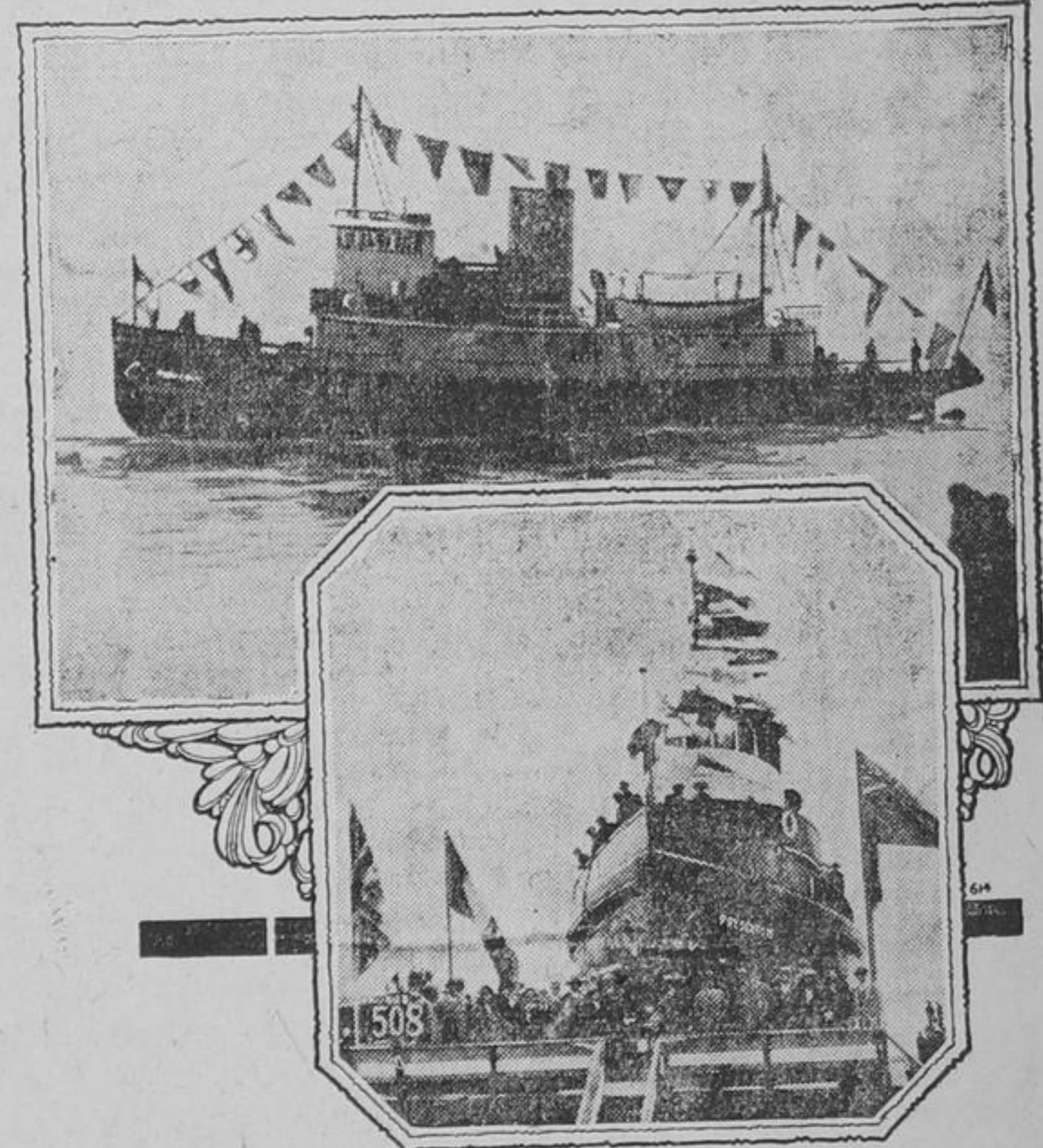

Canada's First Electric Tug



The first electrically-driven tug to be built in Canada was launched at Lauzon, Que., recently, when the "Prescot", Diesel-electric tug for the Canadian Pacific Car and Passenger Transfer Company's service between Prescott, Ont., and Ogdensburg, N.Y., slipped gracefully into the waters of the St. Lawrence after the traditional bottle of champagne had been broken across her bows by Mrs. Duff, wife of M. McD. Duff, manager of the Canadian Pacific Great Lakes Steamship Service. As a pioneer feature in Canadian shipping, the Diesel-electric engines with which the new vessel is equipped, are of special interest to marine engineers. Each of 500 H.P., they are directly connected to twin generators capable of delivering 330 kilowatts, each at 250 volts, when operated at 245 revolutions per minute. In operation, a car barge with three tracks for 16 hundred-ton cars, will be lashed to the starboard counter of the tug which it will be possible to control either from its own wheel-house or from the bridge of the car barge.
