Suffers Loss By Mysterious Fire

The Richmond Hill Fire Brigade was immediately called and arriving in short order did excellent Mrs. Clarence Doner. work in keeping the fire under control and preventing its spread to other buildings which were threatened.

The cause of the fire is unknown The loss is estimated in the neighborhood of \$10,000. which is partly covered by insurance.
