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## GENERAL NEWS AND VIEWS

A valuable black fox recently escaped from the Markham Fox Ranch and for some time has defied all efforts to capture him. Enjoying his liberty to the full the wily fox has preyed on choice Markham fowl much to the disapproval of poultry owners.

The town of Newmarket has been successful in securing a portion of the government grant to aid unemployment and the construction of water mains will be commenced immediately as a means of providing for the unemployed of the municipality.

Aurora will be represented by a Junior and an Intermediate team in the O.H.A. series this year.

There are rumors of a spirited municipal contest in the town of Newmarket in January. Contests are predicted for the offices of Reeve, Deputy-Reeves and Councillors.

The town of Aurora has made application to the controller of unemployment aid funds with the view to having some assistance given to that municipality. It is proposed to construct a trunk sewer.

Barrie is to receive \$5000. from the unemployment relief fund.

Morley Kinnee, of Maple, has been appointed to fill the vacancy of manager of Woodbridge and Vaughan telephone system, caused by the resignation of James Leonard, through illness.

We clip the following from an exchange but have not gone to the trouble of verifying it by actual calculation: "If twelve persons were to agree to dine together every day, but never sit exactly in the same order around the table, it would take 18,000,000 years at the rate of one dinner a day, and they would have to eat more than 470,000,000 dinners, before they could get through all the possible arrangements in which they could place themselves."

A married lady had a surprise party on her birthday recently and her husband presented her with a very pretty piano lamp. He was much flattered when she told him that she intended to give it his name; until he asked her reasons for so peculiar a proceeding. "Well," said she, "you know, dear, it is handsome to look at, requires a good deal of attention; is not remarkably brilliant; sometimes unsteady on its legs; liable to explode when half full; flares up occasionally; is always out at bed time and is bound to smoke."

R. N. Stokes, of the 9th line of Pickering, just west of Clarendon had his barn burned last week. The fire started about 4 a. m. and is believed to be the work of chicken thieves as a bag with five chickens was found in a nearby field. In addition to the barn and contents four horses, one cow, all his implements and a number of hens were burned.

A bear has been reported roaming around the farms in the Gormley district. It has been noticed by different residents and it is said to be very large and that even dogs flee at the sight of him.

Potatoes are being bought in car-load lots from farmers in the Uxbridge district for 60 cents a bag.

Wolves, believed to be in fair size packs, have made their appearance in north Orillia and Mara and Rama townships. W. Baker, of Orillia, has shot one and wounded another in north Orillia a few miles from that town. Packs are moving south to more settled parts it is said, and farmers in the district surrounding Orillia are keeping a close lookout for the animals.

Some 50 young people of Whitchurch Township met at the residence of Morgan Baker, last week with a view of strengthening interest in the history of York County. It was decided to hold meetings monthly. If these meetings prove successful, an organization to foster and study of local history will be formed.

When the big gate at Portsmouth penitentiary opened the other morning a man who has spent nineteen years in the big prison was ushered in for another term of three years. He was "Shorty" Hess, whom the police know from one end of Canada to the other, and in the United States, as well. He is classed as a professional burglar, but has never been known to carry a gun. "Yes, sir, I've been a crook 41 years and when this stretch is over I still will be a crook," he said. The fact that he was going back to prison didn't seem to bother him, his only complaint being about the smallness of his breakfast. "Mr. Sheriff, I wish you would have a photographer here to take a photo of my breakfast and then I could have it enlarged," said the 67-year-old prisoner, who expected to get fifteen years instead of a measly three for his latest job in Windsor. But he can at least have the assurance that although his breakfasts may be small, he can have them regularly.

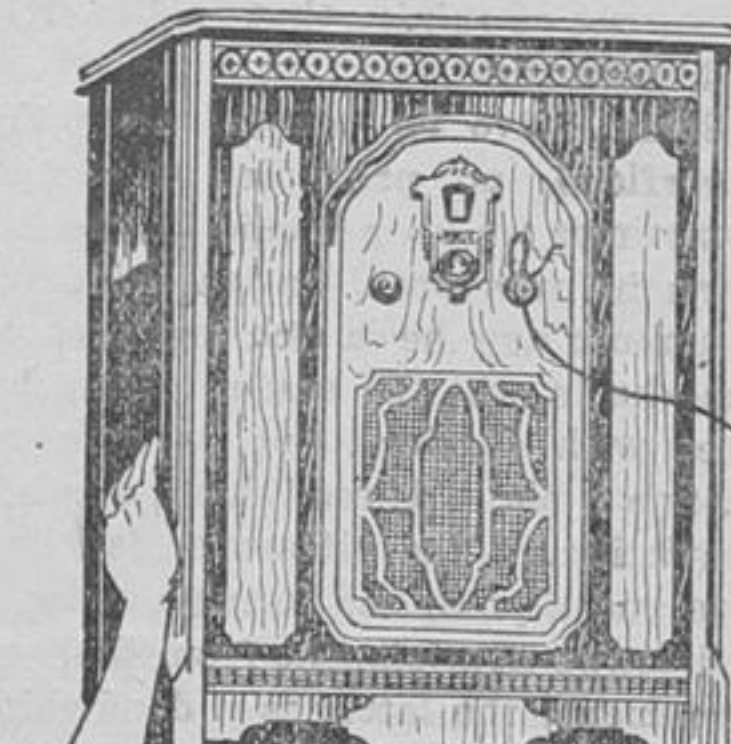

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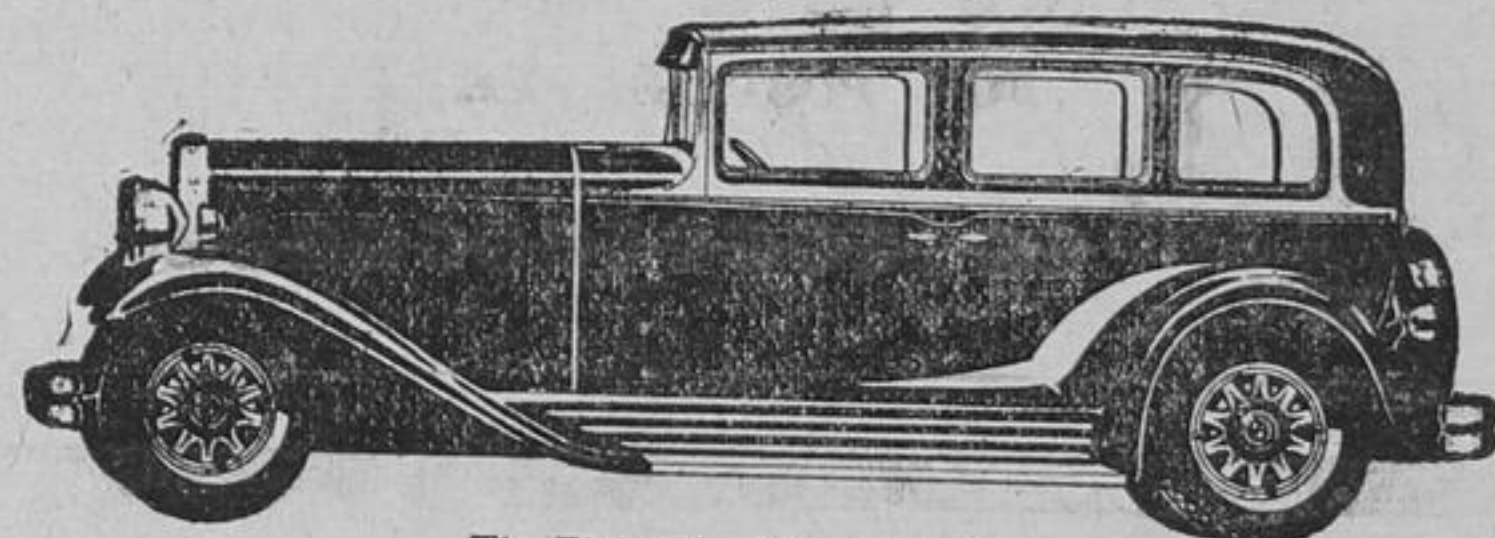
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
