GENERAL NEWS AND VIEWS

Do your Christmas Shopping Early.

Plan now to attend the Community Banquet in the Masonic Hall on WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 10th.

A request that unemployed of Newmarket should register, resulted in 75 men registering. The town will go ahead with the construction of a water main and will receive a portion of the government grant for the relief of unemployment.

A number of car thefts have been reported in Aurora recently.

By an unanimous vote Campbellford Town Council decided recently that the members will be paid for their services. The Mayor will receive \$200 in quarterly sums and the other members \$5.00 for each regular or special meeting attended. Indications are that it will not be many years before all Municipal Councils will be paid. There is a lot of work and worry and far more abuse than honor in municipal work now and it is becoming increasingly difficult in many places to get men to offer themselves for municipal office.

Rev. E. H. Oliver, D.D., Moderator of the United Church of Canada will speak at Markham on Friday evening, November 28th.

Halton County jail is overcrowded, with no less than 21 prisoners, which is reported to be the largest number on record.

Rolling stock, picnic lands and other accessories of the Metropolitan radial line are offered for sale by tender by the Trusts and Guarantee Co., liquidators. Properties include Bond Lake Park, 160 acres of land and the boat houses, pavilions, amusement devices and maintenance equipment. More than 70 pieces of rolling stock will be disposed of.

Alderman Len. Newton, of Orillia, has introduced a resolution to the town council that each member of the council should be paid at least \$10 for each meeting attended. "I can't attend council meetings unless I get paid," he said. The matter has yet to be decided.

Arrangements were in the hands of the president and secretary, Eric White and Bill Mylks. Five tables were in play and the winner of the prize on the evening's play was Frank Grainger. The consolation prize went to N. Cook. Young men of the community are invited to join the Social Club and membership tickets are now on sale for the sum of \$1.00.

The funeral of the late Colin Campbell a highly respected citizen of King township was held from the King City United Church last Friday afternoon. It was one of the largest funerals ever held in the district and the many friends and relatives in attendance was evidence of the widespread regret and sorrow occasioned by his sudden passing. The late Mr. Campbell had been ill for a little over a week, but nothing serious was thought of until late last week, when he developed pneumonia and his death came on Wednesday, November 19th. He is survived by his wife, two sons and two daughters.
