## GENERAL NEWS AND VIEWS

Brampton has been allotted \$30,000 from the unemployment fund of the provincial government.

Old Age Pensions cost Bruce \$11-\$20 in ten months. Another \$6750 was paid for Mothers' Allowances.

Orillia township council will ask the Unemployment Relief Commission to assist them in carrying out roadwork costing \$7,000.

Old timers assure us that this is the first year since fifty years that the swamps froze up in the fall without being full of water.

Headed by Mayor Lambert, Stayner business men are making plans for a huge children's Christmas parade at which Santa Claus will be there in person.

An effort will be made among the business men of Stouffville to finance a brick tower to hold a large clock offered to the municipality by a donor whose name has not yet been published.

While removing a bank to improve a roadway in Midland the bones of a human skeleton were unearthed. From the formation of the skull it was thought the remains were those of an Indian.

Russell Wray, who resides near Port Perry, was the loser in one of the most daring and biggest chicken thefts ever perpetrated in that district. In all, he lost over 700 chickens, together with three turkeys and nine ducks.

Because of the prevalent depression Simcoe County council may make an effort to reduce its sessions to four days instead of five, while every effort will be put forth to keep down expenses. Such was the keynote of the opening session, when Warden W. A. Tom, in his address, asked the members not to bring in requests for unnecessary grants, while W. J. Cunningham, of Alliston, urged the council to wind up its business by Thursday night.

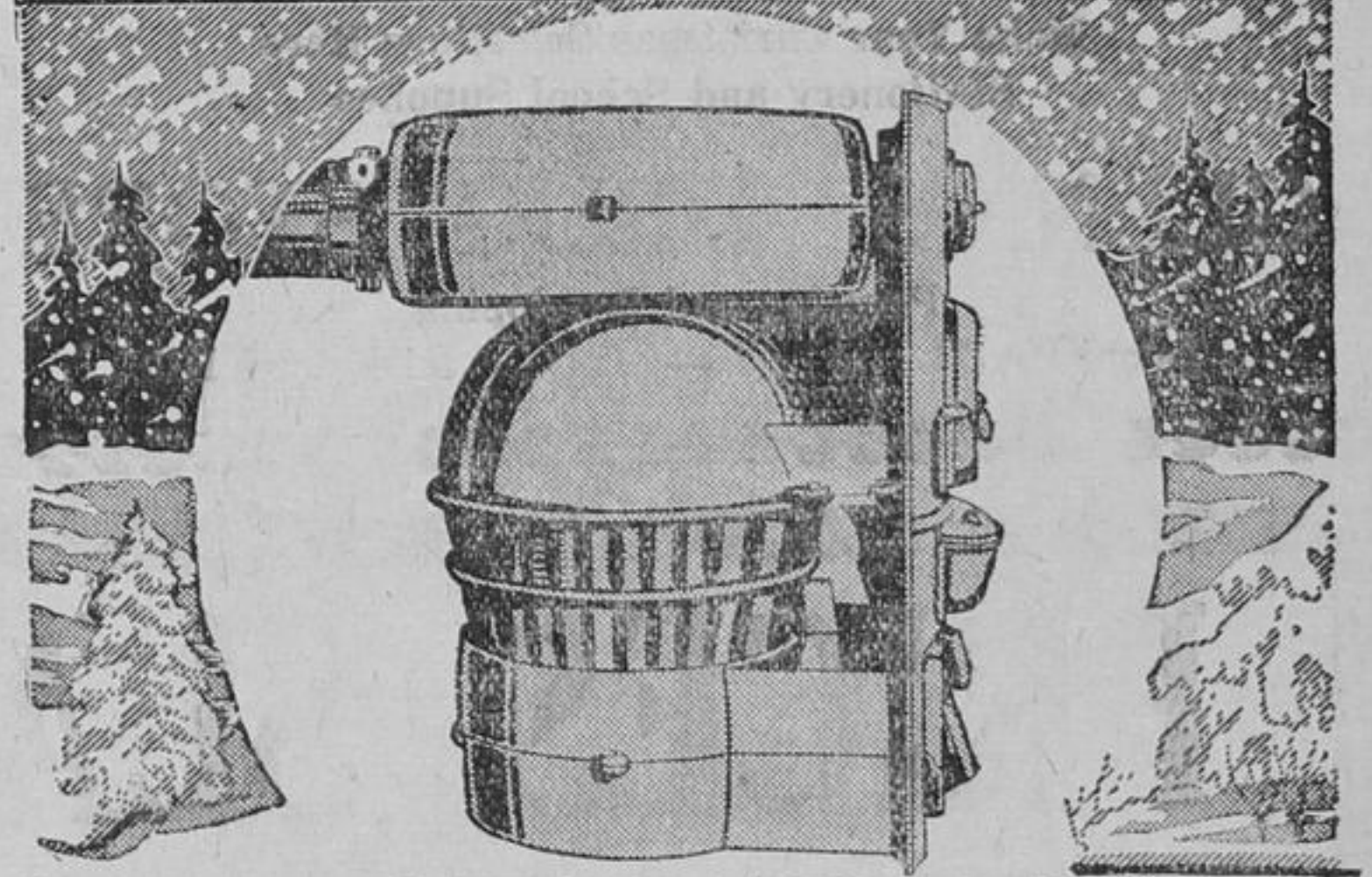
