## GENERAL NEWS AND VIEWS

Community Christmas Tree on  
TUESDAY EVENING, DECEMBER

Christmas is approaching at rapid  
speed. It is now too late to do your

The barns and contents of James  
Shortell, Albion township, Henry Mc-  
Cauley, 7th line Albion and of Gar-  
net Topper, lot 24, con. 8, Vaughan,  
were all destroyed within a week. In  
two cases threshing was in progress  
when the fire broke out.

Aurora erected a new skating arena  
this year and at the last meeting of  
council the booth privileges were ren-  
ted for the season to S. G. Patrick for  
\$135. In Richmond Hill the council  
advertised for tenders for the booth  
for the coming season and did not re-  
ceive any replies. The council has  
canvassed several prospective caterers  
without success. It seems strange  
that a privilege which is sold for \$135  
at Aurora must go begging at the lo-  
cal arena.

The village of Tara was agog re-  
cently when it was learned there  
might be an oil strike within the vil-  
lage limits. The Tara creamery suf-  
fered a loss of nearly \$500 when oil  
got into its hard water well and taint-  
ed about 2,000 pounds of butter. The  
well was pumped out and about twenty  
feet down the shaft workmen notice-  
d oily matter trickling through the  
rock, and the mystery of the tainted  
butter was solved. But the loss may  
be a blessing in disguise for the cream-  
ery company has sent a sample to To-  
ronto for analysis.

Does a pig think? asks the Stayner  
Sun. Last week a firm of butchers  
in the town purchased a pig from the  
local stock yards and took it to their  
slaughter house. The following  
morning the porker could not be  
found. It was learned the pig had  
been purchased from James Graham  
living on the townline. A call was  
put in and the proposed bacon supply  
found among his old-time friends af-  
ter travelling a distance of nearly two  
miles under fences and across fields  
to get home. Thus endeth the first  
chapter of a lively piece of pork.  
Whether he has brains or not he must  
be given credit for getting home.

## Final Meeting Markham Council

The statutory meeting of the Mark-  
ham township council was held on  
Monday afternoon at the township  
hall, Unionville when the business of  
the year was wound up. Reeve W.  
C. Gohn presided and all the members  
were present. Reports of truant  
officers and the Board of Health were  
received and the final accounts for  
the year 1930 were passed.

The report of the Board of Health  
presented by Dr. C. R. MacKay gave  
the municipality a good bill of health.  
It showed the population of the mun-  
cipality as 5,479 an increase of 400  
over 1929. There were eighty-seven  
births and forty-five deaths, with only  
one death under one year old. Chick-  
en Pox, Scarlet Fever, German Meas-  
les and Whooping-Cough in the order  
named accounted for the greatest  
number of cases of communicable dis-  
eases. In the year there was one  
death from tuberculosis and one from  
diphtheria. The report stated that  
samples from 22 wells were taken and  
analyzed and in all except three cases  
favorable reports were received. The  
schools had been inspected and sani-  
tary conditions were found to be sat-  
isfactory.

The clean bill of health was quite  
satisfactory to the council as was the  
accounts for the Board of Health which  
were considerably lower than on  
some previous years. The expenses  
were, Dr. C. R. Mackay \$338.45; W.  
C. Gohn 3 days and mileage \$16.00,  
J. A. Gibson 3 days \$15.00, G. A. M.  
Davison, 3 days \$15.00; W. G. Max-  
well, sanitary inspector \$13.60.

G. Maynard, manager of the Bank  
of Commerce at Unionville, wrote the  
council commending Constable James  
Walker for his very efficient services  
at the time of the hold-up of the  
branch some time ago. He stated  
that the conduct of the case by Con-  
stable Walker was very satisfactory.

Warden E. G. Farr wrote the coun-  
cil thanking the County representa-  
tives for their co-operation in the  
conduct of the County's business dur-  
ing the year now closing, and stating  
that their work had been very benefi-  
cial.


An account was received from Pick-  
ering township showing the amount  
spent this year on the Markham—  
Pickering townline as \$1213.25. Of  
this amount Markham spent \$327.20  
and Pickering \$886.05. The total  
expenditure is shared equally by the  
two municipalities.

The question of municipal relief  
was discussed at some length and al-  
though no work is in progress in the  
township the municipality is taking  
care of certain cases where there is  
actual distress and where conditions  
have been investigated by the council.

Accounts were passed as follows:

\$34.01; Wm. Brooke, valuing sheep  
and mileage \$19.50; G. A. M. Davison,  
stamps \$4.00; Robert Ratcliffe, lum-  
ber \$13.00; Jas. E. Miles, goods for  
charity \$3.75; W. A. Dean, earth for  
Thornhill fill \$150.00; F. H. Stiver,  
valuing sheep \$1.50; P. J. Maher,  
goods for charity \$7.98; G. A. M. Dav-  
ison, 1 sheep killed \$20.00, and flock  
damage \$10.00; Allan Hoover, 2 sheep  
killed by dogs \$36.00 and flock dam-  
age \$6.00; Colin Hood, 1 sheep killed  
\$12.00; Leslie Couperthwaite, 3 sheep  
killed \$21.00 and flock damage \$21.00;  
Robert Myers, caretaker of township  
hall \$20.75; Jas. A. Gibson, truant  
officer \$69.60.
