A group of followers of hockey are firm in their belief that no sport can rival ice-hockey for speed, pointing out that average skaters are able to move faster than even the fastest Debentures runners. This gives hockey the verdict they claim.

It failed to convince a number of lacrosse fans, however. They admit hockey is "the next fastest," but don't believe it quite rivals the speed of the National game. Here's the argument of one box-lacrosse fan: "Speed in a game such as hockey and lacrosse is a matter of the time it takes the ball or puck to travel from one end of the rink to the other. While hockey players move slightly faster, the direct forward pass without zones gives boxlacrosse the advantage. FOUR MILLS FOR THE YEAR 1933

Rate Will Be Not More Than 50 Mills and May Be Less-Rates By Law Passed Except County Levy.

By ize and the county rate will be the same as last year, with a slight reduction to Richmond Hill, owing to a revision of assessment.

Council will meet this week to complete the by-law and the total rate will probably be fifty mills, or forty-nine and a fraction.

The reduction in the requisition of the Board of Education for Public and High School Maintenance amounting to \$1,000.00 for both schools accounted for a reduction in school rates. Reeve Greene and members of finance committee met previous to the regular meeting of council when all estimates were carefully considered and every possible saving made and every possible source of revenue considered. The estimates were carefully pared to allow this substantial reduction in rate, but it is worthy of note that the estimates for roads and sidewalks this year amounted to \$2,000.00 while last year the amount set aside for this department was only

Following the adoption of the estimates, Reeve Greene urged all the heads of the departments to make a real effort to keep within the estimated expenditure. The various amounts to be levied for and the rates required are as follows:
