Mr. Harris has a clean cut eye for beauty and in addition to well kept home surroundings is a lover of fancy horses, and for more than forty years has acted as judge at many trot meets and fairs in Ontario as well as the Western Province. He enjoys excellent health which he largely attributes to walks taken systematically each day, rain or shine.
