

It seems strange that in this district and further north in the Mackenzie River basin salt was first discovered in Canada more than 100 years ago.

The Prairie Provinces are much in need of the development of this industry on account of the high freight rates through Canada on a low priced article. Salt springs are present in Manitoba west of Portage La Prairie and farther north along Winnipegosis and Dauphin Lakes. Also salt deposits exist in British Columbia about forty-five miles inland from Prince Rupert and at a number of places on Vancouver Island. At the present time the best point of distribution of undeveloped deposits would be from those in Manitoba to supply the western Provinces.

The methods of producing commercial salt are quite simple. The natural products are almost entirely free from foreign substances and settling and evaporation methods produce a good product from the brine that is pumped from the wells. The more speedy methods of evaporation produce finer salt, and it is graded by sifting it through different mesh screens.
