GENERAL NEWS AND VIEWS

A HAPPY EASTER

Go to church next Sunday—in fact go every Sunday, but make a special effort to be in your place next Sunday. Special Easter services are planned for all the churches.

Excitement has been at a high pitch in political circles during the week. The succession of exposures and admissions at Queen's Park have overshadowed the happenings at Parliament Hill in public interest, and the developments in the provincial arena will be watched with interest during the next few weeks.

Huntsville Council has passed a by-law requiring licenses from all those engaged in taxi work and cartage, either by horse or motor truck.

Barrie Town Council, at its meeting, Monday evening, decided that relief work be discontinued on April 15 and no meals be served to transients after that date.

The April meeting of the Stouffville Village Council, held on Monday evening, was largely devoted to a discussion of the financial situation of the municipality, and a perusal of the long list of tax arrearages. At the present time unpaid taxes amount to \$2100 plus \$600 or \$700 from 1931.

The advisability of engaging a collector, who would have the power of a bailiff, was discussed, but the final action was to send on the arrearages to the county treasurer for collection within a few days now, when another penalty charge will be added to the bills.

King Council—Special Meeting, at Clerk's Office, Schomberg, April 1st, 1933.

All Members Present.
Lawson-Jefferson—That this Council do hereby appoint a Police Constable, for this Township of King. Duties commence May 1st. Applications for position as Constable for King Township read. Appointment given to Sandy McCallum of King City, R. R. No. 2, for term of 6 mos. commencing May 1st, 1933.

Jefferson-Fox—That the Treasurer be authorized to pay to A. Hambleton the sum of \$5.00 for use of Temperance Hall for Nomination Meeting 1932.

Fox-Lawson—That Mr. Will Bahen, Oak Ridges, be paid the sum of \$2.10 for dragging Bond Ave. The same to be applied to Dog Tax for year 1932.

Jefferson-Thos. MacMurchy—That the Treasurer be authorized to remit taxes wrongly assessed re King and Tecumseh Drainage Scheme of Harry Carter \$2.89; Wilfred Aitchison \$2.71; W. McKinley \$2.52.

Jefferson-Lawson—That Road Superintendent be and is hereby authorized to employ those on Relief in the digging of ditches or other necessary work, and that their pay cheques be applied to their Relief Bills.

The Collector's Rolls were then examined and discussed by the Council and the following resolution was made:

Thos. MacMurchy-Fox—That the Collector be and he is hereby instructed to continue the collection of taxes up to and including April 27th, and that he notify all those, who have not paid their taxes before May 1st, that an extra 5% will be added to all unpaid taxes as required by Statute, except those already returned.

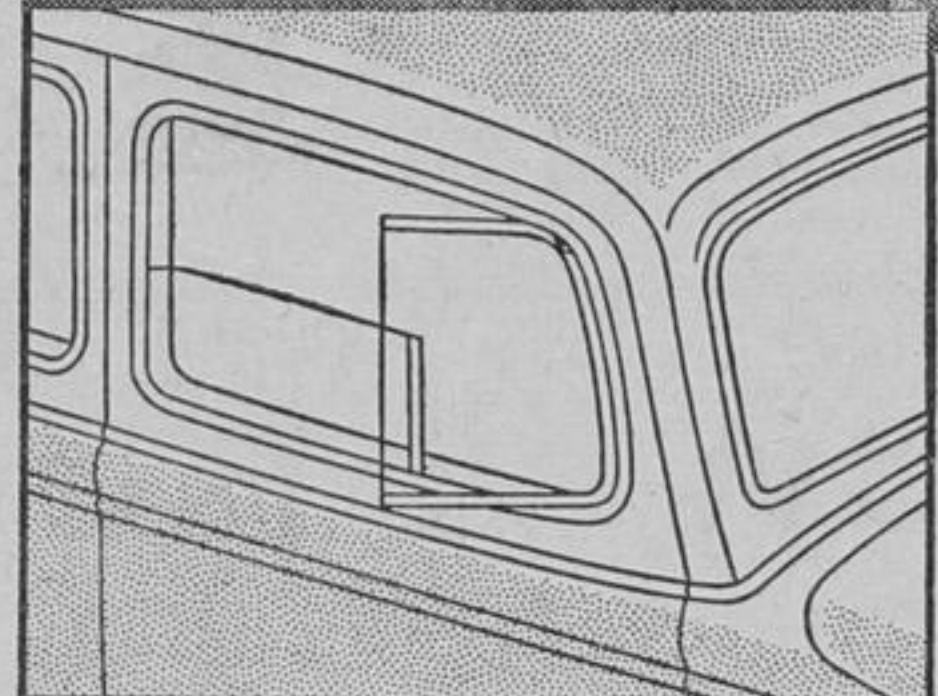
