Young People's Council News

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

By-law I—Specification of Name, Branch and Delegates.

Section I—The name shall be "Richmond Hill Young People's Council."

Section II—The member organizations shall be—St. Mary's A.Y.P.A., Presbyterian Y.P.S. and United Y.P.S.

Section III—The Council shall be composed of fifteen members.

Sub-section I—Five members from each unit branch of the Council.

Sub-section II—(a) Presidents and Secretaries or their permanent personal representatives shall be Council members ex-officio.

(b) Three members of Council will be elected by each unit branch.

(c) Temporary substitution of members illegal unless member is ill or out-of-town on business.

(d) Past Presidents of Young People's Council will be ex-officio members.

By-law II—Powers of Council and Council Executive.

Section I—The Council shall have complete jurisdiction over all joint activities and is not obliged to secure endorsement of unit branches, except through their representatives.

Section II—Council shall not interfere in any way with the internal activities of any branch.

Section III—Council must authorize, organize and direct all joint activities throughout the year.

Section IV—Council Executive must authorize all expenditures, except in an emergency—at which time the President will issue a written order, with the approval of 6 Executive members.

By-law III—Executive of Council.

Section I—Hon. Presidents—one from each church in advisory capacity.

Section II—President, First Vice-President, Second Vice-President, Secretary, Assistant-Secretary, Treasurer and all Past Presidents.

Section III—Convenors of Permanent Committees—Tennis, Social, Dramatic and Rally Convenors.

Section IV—Subsequent Convenors will be members of executive on endorsement by 80% of Council members.

By-law IV—Duties of Officers.

Section I—President—shall convene and preside at all Council and Executive meetings. He or she shall supervise all activities of Council.

Section II—First Vice-President—shall assist in supervision of Council activities and preside at all Council meetings and Executive meetings, in the absence of the President.

Section III—Second Vice-President—shall also assist in supervision of Council activities and preside at Council meetings and Executive meetings in absence of both senior officers.

Section IV—Secretary Sub-Section—Secretary shall keep the minutes of all regular and special meetings.

Sub-section II—Secretary shall notify all Council members of Regular Council meetings at least three days previous to meeting, and shall notify all Council members of Special Council meetings at least ten days previous, inclusive of notification date.

Sub-section III—Written reports and all correspondence shall be retained by Secretary.

Sub-section IV—All contributions, assessments and proceeds from Council activities shall be received by Secretary and after recordings amounts and source, forwarded to Treasurer.

Section V—Assistant Secretary. Sub-section I—Assistant Secretary shall prepare and give out all press announcements and notices, pertaining to Council activities.

Sub-section II—Assistant Secretary—shall be Executive Secretary convening such committee on order of president or on petition of two-thirds of the Executive members. Notification shall be at least seven days previous to meeting.

Section VI—Treasurer. Sub-section I—Treasurer—shall retain all bills, receipts, vouchers and records of receipts and expenditures during his or her term of office.

Sub-section II—All bills, receipts, vouchers, check stubs, bank book and record books shall be presented for audit at least three weeks previous to annual meeting.

Sub-section III—Treasurer's reports

shall be presented at every regular Council meeting and the annual report must have the auditor's certificate attached.

Sub-section IV—Accounts shall be paid monthly by cheque, when properly authorized—as stated in By-law II—Section IV.

Section VII—Convenors. Sub-section I—Convenor will appoint his or her committee from council members, avoiding as far as possible the duplication of members on too many committees.

Sub-section II—Convenor is entirely responsible for his or her committee and reports should be made regularly to Council for endorsement, rejection, alteration or any action deemed necessary by Council.

Sub-section III—Non-active committee members shall be replaced by convenor and work of committee delegated to all committee members.

Sub-section IV—Convenor will organize and direct all activities relating to his or her committee, when such activities have been approved by the Council.

Sub-section V—Convenor shall submit written committee report to President or acting President, at least two days previous to Regular Council meeting.

Sub-section VI—Convenor may authorize small expenditures when approved by President or acting President.

By-law V—Meetings of Council and Executive Committee. Section I—The Regular Council meeting will be held on the first Friday of each month on notification by Secretary as provided in By-law IV—Section IV—Sub-section II.

Section II—The Special meeting of Council shall be held on a Friday, with proper notification as provided in Sub-section II—Section IV of By-law IV.

Section III—A quorum of Council shall consist of 10 members.

Section IV—A quorum of the Executive shall consist of 6 officers.

Section V—Executive shall be convened by Assistant Secretary as provided in Sub-section IV—Section V—By-law IV.

By-law VI—Committees. Section I—Council shall appoint Convenors to investigate, organize and report on any proposed activity.

Section II—Non-Council Council members may be selected by Convenor or as committee members in an advisory capacity.

By-law VII—Amending of Constitution. Section I—This constitution is subject to amendment if—

(1) Notice of motion to amend constitution, specifying alterations or additions is given at a previous regular meeting of Council.

(2) A motion to suspend the rules receives the support of 80% of the Council members, that is (12) twelve members.
