## GENERAL NEWS AND VIEWS

A larger crowd than last year attended the annual Spring Fair at Uxbridge on May 24th, but the number of exhibitors was considerably less than in former years.

According to a resolution passed at the recent meeting of Markham township council the assessors will notify the constable of dog owners who have not paid their dog tax, and the constable is instructed to collect the tax or destroy the dog. This should get rid of a lot of wandering canines in Markham township.

All kinds of crops throughout the district have experienced wonderful growth in the past ten days. The time apparently lost through unfavorable and backward spring weather would now seem to be more than regained.

Owen Sound Council has passed a resolution advising the Board of Education, Police Commission, Library Board and Parks Commission, that Council will be unable to pass estimates to them in excess of a percentage of taxes that is collected this year, based on 1932 estimates.

Applicants for relief in Midland next winter will not be considered unless they have made a real attempt to cultivate a vegetable garden this summer. They will also be notified that fuel next winter will be supplied in greatly reduced quantities.

Salaries of teachers in Coldwater's continuation and public schools are to be cut 20 per cent, effective Sept. 1. Six teachers, two in the continuation school and four in the public school, will be affected by the cut which will reduce the annual salary expenditure by \$1,490.

At a meeting of Alliston public school board it was decided to throw all teaching positions for next year open to applicants who must state the salary they will expect to receive.
