With reference to weed classicication and seed grades under the Seeds Act which is administered by the Seed Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, weeds are classified into three groups according to the seriousness of their character. No. 1 grade for seed of clovers and grasses allows no seeds of primary noxious weeds. No. 2 grade allows 5 primary noxious weed seeds per ounce or 20 primary and secondary noxious weed seeds combined per ounce, while No. 3 grade allows 25 primary noxious weed seeds, or 80 primary and secondary noxious weed seeds combined, or a total of 500 weed seeds per ounce. The use of seed grain that has not been well cleaned is responsible for the introduction of many new weeds and the increase of those already in the land.
