REGULAR COUNCIL SESSION-ESTIMATED COST OF YONGE ST. LIGHTING UNDER \$1500.00

His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, Hon. Dr. Herbert A. Bruce has accepted the invitation of the municipal council of Richmond Hill Villiage to attend the Armistice Day memorial service Sunday afternoon, Nov. 12th, at 3 p.m. Other prominent personages have been invited and a fitting program has been e arranged for the service this year The ministers of the different church es will take part and a thirty piece Salvation Army band from Toronto will take part. Richmond Hill Trumpet Band will head the parade which will form up at the north end of the Town and march to the memorial where the service will be held. Plans for this service were discussed at the regular meeting of the council Monday evening, and it is apparent Reeve Greene and the members of council are sparing no effort to make the service one of the best ever held in this district and a fitting memorial for those who made the supreme sacrifice during the Great War Veterans' Organizations of the Coun-Ity and district have been invited to attend and take part.

Street lighting was discussed at some length by the members.
