Sprinkle with 1/4 cupful flour to which I teaspoon of salt and 1/8 teaspoon of pepper have been added, together with 1 teaspoon of dried parsley and 1/2 teaspoon of tyme. Cover and give the boys your support. They and cook in fairly hot oven for an hour and a half to two hours, depending on the tenderness of the chicken. 
