



The nomination meeting held at Unionville Friday afternoon was fairly well attended despite the bad condition of the roads, although there was not as large a crowd as in previous years.

Reeve Padget gave a clear and detailed account of the year's business both in the township and in the county Dealing with county affairs he pointed out that the equalized assessment of the township had been reduced, dis cussed the vexed question of hospitalization which in the past has been a very expensive item for the county but which was handled this year with a considerable saving to the taxpayers. He reviewed the road work done in the township and pointed out that no property was sold for taxes in Markham township this year. Speaking of relief the reeve said he had done everything in his power to keep the expense down and at the same tim esee that those in need were provided for. Every case of a party securing relief was first given a careful investigation. In appealing for re-election Reeve Padget said he had made an honest effort to serve the best interests of the ratepayers of Markham township and if re-elected would continue to work for the good of the township.
