their training whenever possible? 3. Levying a sufficient tax on commercialized traffic, to meet the cost of the construction and maintenance of highways?

4. Lowering the rate of interest on farm loans, under the Agricultural Development Board?

5. A tax on meals served in hotels and restaurants, to be called "The Hospital Tax," and which would relieve the municipalities of the present direct tax for indigents?
