The new Library quarters will be on the second floor of the municipal building and preparations for the change will commence at once. The room to be occupied by the Library will be remodelled and redecorated and when completed should make very attractive quarters.

The Library Board plans to have all books catalogued for the convenience of patrons and in order to have this work carried out as expeditiously as possible it is requested that all library books now out be returned at once. It is also announced that it will be necessary to close the Library until the change is effected, so no more books will be issued until further notice.
