One of the most attractive homes in the district, that of Mr. and Mrs. Dave Middleton, Carrville, was rewarded with a diploma of Horticultural Achievement by the Toronto Horticultural Society. The honor came as a complete surprise to Mr. and Mrs. Middleton. The diploma is signed by Lionel Godson president, and George C. Harris.

Although some municipalities are imposing a heavier tax on police dogs than on other breeds the Municipal World rules that there is no authority in the Dog Tax and Sheep Protection Act to make it legal. Suspension of George B. Little, Superintendent of the York County Children's Aid Society, was ordered Friday by Hon. David A. Croll, Minister of Welfare. The suspension is effective at once. Mr. Little's assistant, Mrs. Katharine Stone, assumes his duties temporarily.
