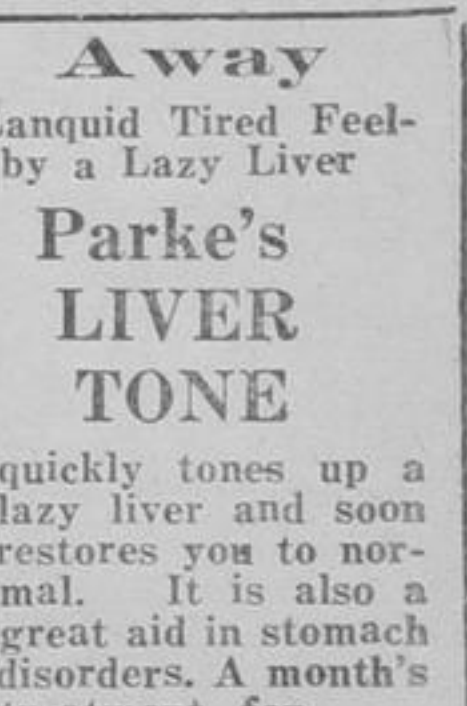

Pacific Railway Ontario police

Captain R. G. Latta, skipper of  
the liner Empress of Britain and  
commander of the Canadian Pacific  
fleet, retired from active duty  
recently. He was succeeded on the  
bridge of the Britain by Captain  
R. N. Stuart, V.C., D.S.O.,  
U.S.N.C., R.D., R.N.R. Captain  
Stuart was promoted to the post  
of commodore of the Canadian  
Pacific fleet  
Indicating the trend towards  
greater production and recovery  
of business, substantial increase  
in the second quarter of 1934 as

period of 1933 is shown in the  
recently published production  
figures of Consolidated Mining and  
Smelting, one of world's greatest  
mining companies.

recently, A. N. Hobkirk, veteran  
engineer, completed 43 years of  
continuous service with the railway,  
most of it at the throttle of  
an engine. "I have always liked  
my work and I hate to quit," said  
Mr. Hobkirk.  
Founded June 18, 1874, by  
George and Mathew Beatty and  
with agencies, warehouses, offices  
or depots across Canada, New  
Zealand, the United Kingdom and  
fifty other countries, the national  
and world-wide exporting house  
of Beatty Bros. manufacturers of  
washing machines and farm im-  
plements, celebrated its Diamond  
Jubilee at Fergus, Ont., last  
month.  
John F. Sweeting, industrial  
commissioner of the Canadian  
Pacific Railway, states in an  
official publication of the railway  
that there is a decidedly firm  
tone of confidence in the West  
and increased activity in many  
industries, with the tourist business  
promising to be better at all  
resorts this year.  
An increase of 877,900 lbs. in  
the Nova Scotia lobster catch  
during the month of May was  
instrumental in raising the landed  
values \$333,468 over the same  
month in 1933, according to an  
announcement by the Department  
of Fisheries on June 28th.

attended.  
L. G. Prevost, K.C., assistant  
solicitor, Canadian Pacific Rail-  
way, has ben promoted to the  
post of solicitor of the company  
for the province of Quebec, suc-  
ceeding the late Rodolphe Para-  
dis, K.C., the appointment being  
effective as from April 1.

Captain David Sinclair Mc-  
Queen, commander of the Cana-  
dian Pacific liner Duchess of  
Atholl, will retire on May 1, after  
44 years spent on sea service,  
most of which was in the employ  
of the old Allan Line and Cana-  
dian Pacific Steamships.

THE PICTURE OF HEALTH  
More admiration of personal ap-  
pearance is conveyed in the phrase  
"the picture of health" than in any  
other of the many complimentary ex-  
pressions which are used to describe  
the clean-cut, attractive, capable and  
happy-looking individual.

That it is the popular desire to have  
this healthy appearance is shown by  
the enormous sums expended to per-  
suade the public of the health value  
of this and that commercial product.  
Most of it is cleverly done, but un-  
fortunately scientific truths are dis-  
torted in too many cases, leaving no  
grounds for excuses; the method used  
is simply misrepresentation.  
The wrinkled brow, the frown and  
headache from eye-strain is just a  
blurred, out-of-focus reflection of  
health. The diseased or abnormal  
body cannot reflect the health which  
it does not possess. Those who look  
the picture of health are really healthy  
in mind and body. They have given  
reasonable care to their bodies, and  
they have made a satisfactory adjust-  
ment to the world in which they have  
to live—they are healthy, happy and  
contented.  
There is nothing artificial about  
this picture of health. It is an un-  
touched photograph from within, not  
a mere paint and powder job from  
without. It is a matter of taste as to  
whether or not eyelids should be dark-  
ened, cheeks rouged and hair dyed,  
but no one is deceived into thinking  
that these alterations are real; they  
are often an obvious attempt to pro-  
vide something in the place of the  
lost picture of health.  
Sound teeth and healthy gums are  
made possible by proper foods and  
reasonable care. You cannot make  
bricks without straw; neither can you  
build sound teeth without calcium,  
and the best source of calcium is the  
old reliable friend from the cradle  
to old age—milk.  
The picture of health is a clean one.  
There is about it nothing of the crack-  
ed and varnished finish of some dingy  
old painting; there is colour, bright-  
ness and cleanliness. The clean skin  
is a healthier skin; it covers a body  
that appears strong and capable. The  
starved and hungry-looking individual  
is not the picture of health, neither is  
the person who is overweight. Neither  
undereating nor overeating promotes  
good health.  
If you would be the picture of  
health, you must rely upon good habits  
of living to attain this end. There is  
nothing which refreshes like sleep;  
there is nothing that cleanses like  
soap and water. There is no food to  
replace milk. These are the things  
to know and to make use of in your  
daily life.
