RECORD MAJORITY FOR BILL MULOCK IN MONDAY'S ELECTION

Popular Liberal Candidate Scored Notable Victory and Huge Majorities Piled Up in All Sections of the Riding — Enthusiastic Supporters Cheered Victor Following Election.

Col. Bill Mulock was elected member of parliament for the historic riding of North York in Monday's by-election with a majority of about 3,700 votes. It is a record majority for this constituency and is a striking tribute to the popularity of the Liberal candidate and unmistakable evidence of the unpopularity of the Bennett government.

The great swing in support of Col. Mulock was in evidence in every part of the riding and in practically every polling sub-division he led his opponent with substantial majorities.

The vote in Richmond Hill gave a Liberal majority of 90 as compared with a majority for the late Col. Lennox of 75 in the last federal election. As soon as the local result was made known it was taken as an indication of the swing in the entire riding. Early returns gave Col. Mulock a substantial lead and from the first the result was never in doubt.

As soon as the election was conceded Col. Mulock accompanied by Morgan Maker M.P.P. and hundreds of enthusiastic supporters started on a triumphal tour of the riding and the celebrations kept up until the early hours of the morning.

At Richmond Hill the procession was met by the Richmond Hill Trumpet Band and the victorious candidate seated on top of a truck was cheered all along the line as the procession made its way along Yonge Street.

Happy, but modest in victory Col. Mulock sincerely thanked all those who supported him and pledged again his best efforts on behalf of the people of North York.

Accompanying Col. Mulock on his triumphal tour was Mrs. Mulock who has been active throughout the campaign in the interests of her husband and who has won a host of friends in North York.

From Richmond Hill Col. Mulock journeyed to Woodbridge where he again received a great welcome. A large bon fire was lighted on the main street and the Woodbridge Band was out for the occasion, for Woodbridge like practically all other municipalities in the constituency gave the Liberal candidate a majority. From Woodbridge the procession proceeded to the Northern part of the riding ending up at Sutton in the early morning hours. A very dense fog made travelling on the highway difficult and prevented the successful candidate from visiting all section of the riding.

Col. Mulock has been deluged with congratulatory messages from all parts of Canada. Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, federal Liberal leader, wired as follows: "I am delighted beyond words at Monday's magnificent victory in North York. Please accept warmest congratulations of myself and party. Kindly extend same to our many friends in constituency which has added one more memorable political contact to the historic record which our respective names and families have been so intimately associated for more than a century."

From his St. Thomas home Premier Mitchell F. Hepburn wired: "Heartiest congratulations, we are all proud of you." And from Halifax, Premier Angus L. Macdonald said "Warmest congratulations on your great victory. Your entrance to the House of Commons will strengthen the party greatly and will again bring into public life one of the great names of Liberalism."
