A FAVORITE TESTED RECIPE - Orange Cream Pie -

11/2 cups unstrained orange juice, 3 tablespoons flour, 1/4 teaspoon salt, ½ cup granulated sugar, 2 egg yolks slightly beaten, 1 tablespoon lemon uice, 1 tablespoon butter. Combine crange juice with flour, sugar and salt. Stir and cook until mixture thickens, add egg yolks, cook 2 minutes longer. Remove from heat, add lemon juice and butter. Pour into baked pie shell. Top with meringue.

- Meringue -2 egg whites, 1/8 teaspoon salt, 3 tablespoons fruit sugar. Beat egg whites with salt until stiff, add sugar 50 yards race-9 years and underslowly, beating in well. Bake in a moderate oven until decidedly brown-
