A FAVORITE TESTED RECIPE - Grape Juice Pie -

3 tablespoons corn starch, 1/2 cup granulated sugar, 2 egg yolks, 1/8 teaspoon salt, 2 cups hot grape juice, baked pastry shell. Combine first four ingredients, add to hot grape juice, stir and cook over hot water until thickened, about 10 minutes. Cool. Pour into pie shell. Cover with meringue.

- Meringue -

2 egg whites, 1/8 teaspoon salt, 3 gradually and beat in well. Bake in moderate oven until browned.
