HOW BEST TO TEACH MANNERS

Once more a leading educator deplores the lack of politeness among young people. Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia University, speaking at the opening services of his own institution, wonders "why it is that youth can come to full adolescent years with no apparent appreciation of the difference between good manners and their opposite."

Some blame parents, who, strangely enough, may be persons of known courtesy, liked and admired for their urbanity. In another part of Dr. Butler's address may be found a parallel which may throw some light on the subject, in which he distinguishes rent year's taxes is due Letween attending college and getting an education.
