A FAVORITE TESTED RECIPE — Date Crumb Squares — 1/4 cup butter, 1/2 cup granulated sugar, 1 egg well beaten, 1 cup pastry flour, 1/4 teaspoon soda, 1/2 teaspoon baking powder, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 cup sour milk, 1 1/2 cups dates cut in pieces, 1/2 cup orange juice, 1 cup corn flakes crushed. Cream butter, add sugar gradually, cream well together. Add egg beat well, add sifted dry ingredients alternately with sour milk, spread thinly in a buttered pan (8 x 12). Cook dates and orange juice until dates are soft, cool, spread over dough, cover with crushed cornflakes, bake in hot oven for 20 to 25 minutes. When cool cut in squares.
