Odd Epitaphs
 An amazing one in the Old Men's Hospital at Norwich, England, is one reading:
 "In memory of Mrs. Phoebe Crewe who died May 28th, 1817, aged 77 years, who during forty years practice as a midwife in this city, brought into the world 9,730 children."
 Another rather amusing one was found in Surrey, England: "Sacred to the memory of Nathaniel Goldbold Esq., Inventor and Proprietor of that excellent medicine—THE VEGETABLE BALSAM—renowned for cure of Consumption and Asthma. Died December 17th, 1799. Died of fevers and asthma."
 Here is one over a grave in England—"Here lies the body of Lady O'Looney. Great niece of Burke, commonly called the Sublime. She was blonde, passionate, and deeply religious, also painted in water colours."
 The gem of them all comes from Woolwich, England, which reads—"Sacred to the memory of Major Brush, Royal Artillery, who was killed by the accidental discharge of a pistol by his orderly, April 15th, 1831. Well done, good and faithful servant."
 An epitaph in Princess Anne County, Virginia, tells the brief and unfortunate story of a man who should have known better—"Here lies the body of Henry Moore, who got in the way of 44."
 At Cross Kirk, Shetland Islands, a grave-stone bears the following—"Donald Robertson, born January 1st, 1785, died June 4th, 1848, aged 63 years. He was a peaceful and quiet man and a sincere Christian. His death was very much regretted which was caused by the crass stupidity of Laurence Tulloch of Clotherton, who sold him nitre instead of Epsom Salts by which he died in three hours."
