**PUBLIC ENEMY**

The term "public enemy" has taken on a new meaning these days since it has been used, by our neighbours to the south, to designate the most dangerous of their gangster element. Public enemies there always have been, and public enemies will likely continue to annoy and irritate, and, some of them, to menace the rest of mankind.

Those who are responsible for the care of the public health have always to contend with a certain number of persons who insist upon what they are pleased to call liberty, but which is, in practice, license to endanger the lives of others. These are public enemies because they are against the public welfare owing to their selfish insistence upon doing what they want to do, where, how and why it pleases them, despite what this means to others.

This group includes such people as those who refuse to report communicable disease in their homes; they dodge the responsibility of maintaining quarantine regulations because it means some inconvenience to them. It is either ignorance or selfishness which places personal comfort above the welfare of the rest of the community, a form of selfishness which may, and frequently does, lead to the loss of life just as surely as do the bullets which are fired by another kind of public enemy.

The winter brings out, in full vigour, a crop of public enemies who have been described as "open-faced" sneezers and coughers. Not for them to hang their heads or hide their faces behind a pocket-handkerchief! Not at all; they insist upon doing their coughing and sneezing in the most open way possible.

It is difficult to imagine what goes on in the minds of such people. Is it a desire to make others suffer, to pass on to them the germs of disease, spreading colds, tuberculosis and pneumonia? If so, is it not the worst form of selfishness? It can hardly be ignorance. If it is, then it is comparable to "not knowing that it was loaded," for certainly everyone has heard that coughs and sneezes are spreaders of disease.

What then should be done to these public enemies of public health, these selfish individuals who endanger you personally, your family and your friends? Laws do not reach them effectively, but they do feel the effect of social disapproval. If each of us would show these people that their conduct is not acceptable, this would do more to change their habits than anything else.
