No Election In Sight In Local Municipal Arena

The Richmond Hill municipal council are nearing the close of another year and a review of the financial affairs of the municipality at the regular meeting on Monday revealed that things are in a very satisfactory position. The council has kept its spending well within its budget, said the treasurer, A. J. Hume. It was estimated that payment of taxes for the year will be about 70 per cent, but it is hoped that citizens will make a special effort before the 15th of this month to at least make some payment on their tax obligation.

The 1934 council has had a very satisfactory year. The business of the village has been conducted in a most harmonious manner and the municipal affairs of the municipality appear to be running along very efficiently. There are many severe problems to face including unemployment and relief, but the council has been remarkably successful and effective in meeting and dealing with these major problems. With the New Year only a few weeks away there is a notable absence of any rumblings in the municipal arena and it appears likely that the 1934 council will be returned by acclamation, as so far no one has intimated a desire to contest any of the seats.

The council received notice that L. H. Clement through his solicitors had issued a writ against the town for damages resulting from an accident on Richmond Street on October 23rd. Mr. Clement claims that the accident was caused by the condition of the roadway. The town referred the claim to the insurance company and the council has been advised that the insurance company claims that Mr. Clement has no claim against the town as the roadway was not dangerous to any traffic travelling at reasonable rate of speed.

Residents in the neighborhood of the waterworks pumping station complained of the nuisance of water overflowing the tank. Engineer McBride stated that it was difficult not to overflow the tank as the float which acts as an indicator is broken. An automatic switch would cost in the neighborhood of \$300 and as council members did not feel like making an expenditure of that size just now Mr. McBride was asked to watch closely and try and avoid having the tank run over.

A resolution of thanks was passed expressing the thanks of the municipality for a flag presented to the village by the Women's Institute.

The annual nomination meeting will be held in the Municipal Hall, Monday, Dec. 31st, and the election, if necessary, will be held Monday, Jan. 7th. Harry Glover, J. Sanders and A. B. Macdonald were named as Deputy Returning Officers and W. Savage, Frank Barker and Miss Phyllis Glass as poll clerks.

Mr. James McLean was unanimously chosen as chairman of the committee to have charge of the annual Community Christmas Tree.

INDUSTRIALIST & RADIO SPEAKER TO SPEAK IN RICHMOND HILL

The Meteor Taxis Group of United Church Sunday School, under the leadership of Mr. Paul Angle, is sponsoring a free lecture by Mr. Harry Hallatt to be held in Masonic Hall, Tuesday, Dec. 18th, at 8 p.m. Mr. Hallatt, who is President of the Dennison Brick and Tile Co., Windsor, has been speaking over the radio for the past two years, advocating a change in the monetary system of Canada. He is a successful business man, a keen student of finance and a fluent speaker, who has won a large and enthusiastic following. He advocates a system which he calls The Wage Dollar Money System. He claims that it will accomplish what President Roosevelt is avowedly trying to accomplish, namely, make money of constant value throughout the years, and prevent recurring depressions. This is not a new political party or social system, but a simple money system which could be adopted and put into practice by any party or system of government. It is probably a certainty that if the public was convinced that the system would accomplish what Mr. Hallatt claims, they would soon force any government to adopt it and the sponsors of this lecture believe that they are performing a useful community service in giving the citizens of Richmond Hill and district an opportunity to hear and pass judgment on a movement that is sure to become a public issue in the near future.
