Rt. Hon. W. L. M. King Eulogized By Alexander MacGregor K. C. At East York Reform Meeting

Liberals of Historic Riding Hear Champion of Liberalism
Praise Founders of Responsible Government

Heather Hall, Agincourt, was packed to the doors last Tuesday evening for the annual meeting of the East York Reform Association. In addition to about six hundred delegates there were a large number of enthusiastic King Government supporters from all parts of the riding.

Alex D. Bruce, past president of the association and a widely recognized authority on proportional representation, one of the Liberal platform planks, conducted the election of officers for the coming year under this system. Lyman Kennedy of Agincourt was enthusiastically acclaimed in the office of president for another year, his election being made unanimously amid rousing cheers. Harry C. McConnell of Todmorden was elected first vice-president, W. C. Rayfield 2nd vice-president, and E. J. Stiver of Unionville secretary.

The chairman called on Alexander MacGregor K.C. who contested the riding for the Liberals in 1917 and again in 1921, to address the gathering and on rising to speak Mr. MacGregor was given an ovation which left no doubt as to his popularity in East York.

Mr. MacGregor praised the good work of the East York Riding executive including their exacting work during the recent provincial election campaign.

Responsible to the People

The speaker inspired great enthusiasm when he pointed out that it was the farmer forebears of many of the electors of the north part of the riding who under the valiant leadership of the illustrious William Lyon Mackenzie, the grandfather of Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, took their lives in their hands when they stood out for the vital principle of the responsibility of the executive of the government to the people and won that noble fight.

Mr. MacGregor cited the valuable opinion of Sir John Willison, the distinguished former editor of the Globe and later editor of The News and Chief Canadian representative of the London Times, that the principle established by that uprising of 1837 of the responsibility of the executive of the people, is the basic principle underlying the constitution of the whole British Commonwealth of Nations to-day. This, declared Mr. MacGregor, is the greatest political accomplishment in the history of Canada. He also pointed out that the Hon. Alexander Mackenzie, able and incorruptible Scotch statesman who actually worked as a journeyman in the construction of the old Parliamentary library at Ottawa and on the Royal Military College at Kingston, and rose to be the Prime Minister of Canada, represented the riding of East York at the time of his death in 1892. A deep treasured tradition with Mr. MacGregor is that the Hon. Alexander Mackenzie and Mr. MacGregor's late father Patrick MacGregor, who was founder of the Toronto Gaelic Society, were close friends, and Hon. Alexander Mackenzie was a pallbearer at the late Patrick MacGregor's funeral in 1882. Lord Dufferin declared that Hon. Alexander Mackenzie was the very soul of honour and one of the noblest public men in British history.

He would venture to represent this great historic riding of East York Mr. MacGregor feeling declared, must realize he assumes a very grave responsibility and one which he should approach with due humility.

Mr. MacGregor referred to the peculiar fitness of Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King for the high office of Prime Minister of Canada at the critical time in our history. He pointed out that Mr. King has been fitting himself for the responsibilities of leadership and government ever since he entered Toronto University in 1891 and had evidenced his great zeal and devotion for the best interests of Canada when he refused, as Sir William Mulock recently recalled appointment at a salary of \$10,000 per year as Professor of Economics at Harvard University, to accept at the hands of Sir William, then Minister of Labor in the Laurier cabinet of the talents, the position of deputy minister of labor. As St. Paul would say, remarked Mr. MacGregor, Mr.

King magnified the office for he exposed sweat shop conditions in the manufacture of uniforms for the Post, Office department which led to an insertion of a clause in the contracts for those uniforms requiring contractors to pay a minimum wage. A man's past, declared Mr. MacGregor, is the best prophesy of what his future will be. Anyone who fairly weighs Mr. King in that unerring high-scale will readily conclude that he is the logical man to inaugurate the New Deal in Canada and that Mr. King will surely become Prime Minister of Canada after the next Federal election.

Mr. Harry Johnson, Liberal organizer and himself a resident of the riding, addressed the meeting and made valuable suggestion in regards to the organization of the constituency.

Colin Campbell, M.P., the victor in the recent by-election in Frontenac-Addington, and the youngest member of the House of Commons, (33), who was eloquently introduced by Col. W. P. Mulock, M.P., the recent victor in North York, delivered a most instructive address, showing how vitally the mass of the people is affected by tariff—pointing out that 90% of the total invested capital of Canada, profits by a moderate tariff, but loses by a high tariff. Statistics, Mr. Campbell showed, actually bear out that fundamental fact.

Alexander Bruce, past-president of the Association; Dennis McCarthy, Harry Saunders, Reeve of Scarborough Township, and the new members of the Executive, also, addressed the gathering, which only dispersed far on into the wee small hours of the morning.

Community Tree Saturday Afternoon

There will be carol singing in which all choir members of the district are invited to join after which well filled stockings will be given to all the kiddies by Santa. Don't miss this big community event, Saturday afternoon, at the Richmond Hill arena at 3.30 p.m.
