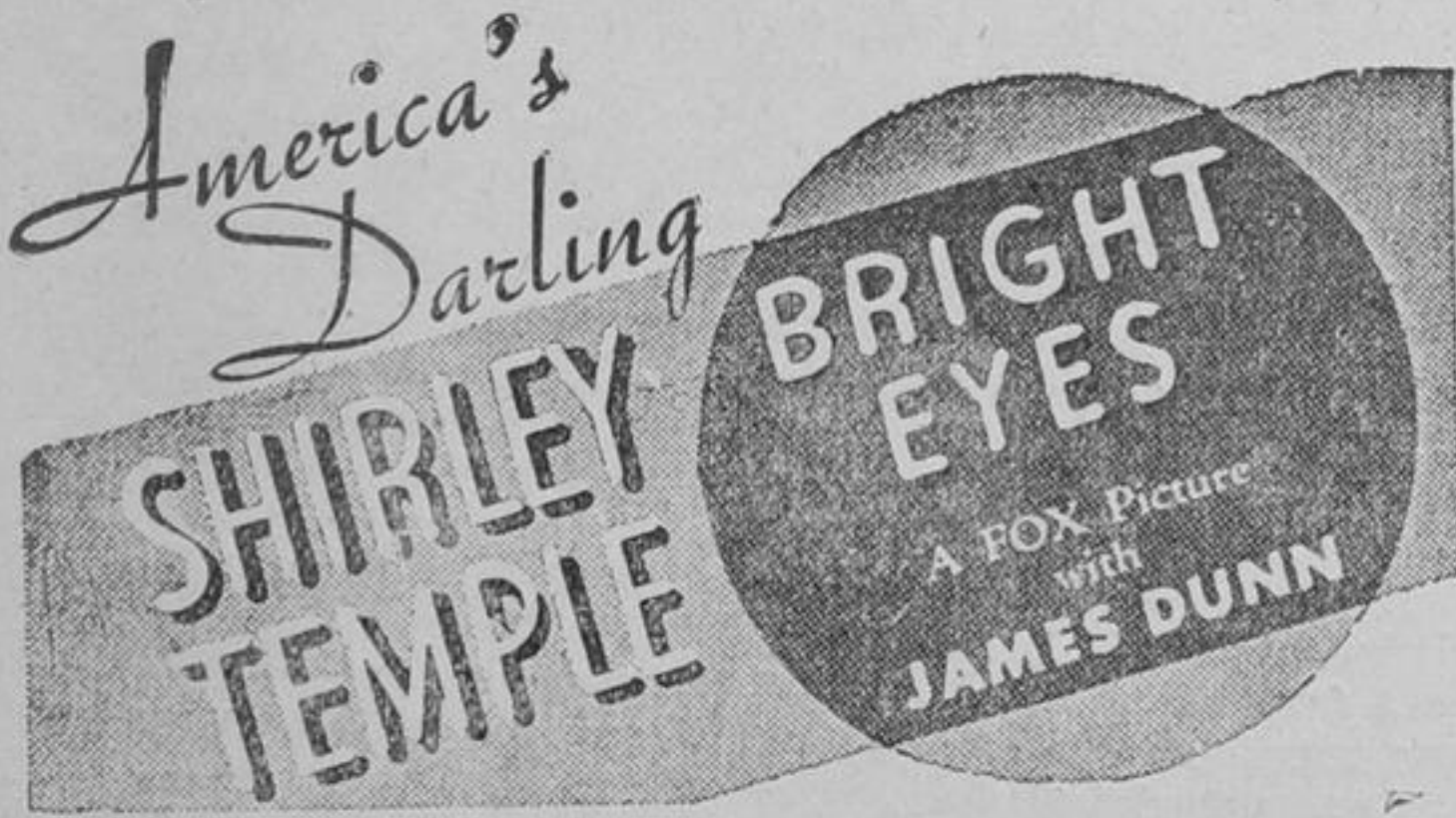

#### LATE MRS. JAMES DIXON

Richmond Hill was deeply saddened on Monday evening, Jan. 21st, by the passing of one of its well known residents, Mrs. James Dixon. She was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Sheppard of this village. Deceased was in her 60th year and was in apparent good health until three months ago when she was seized with a serious sickness although she was active about her home until Christmas. She was of a quiet and kindly disposition and took a keen interest in her home surroundings.

Mrs. Dixon was born in Richmond Hill in 1875 and had lived in and around the village most of her life. She was married to James Dixon nearly thirty-six years ago when they moved to the farm on the third concession of Markham where they lived successfully for a number of years. About two years ago they came to the village to retire. She leaves to mourn her loss a husband, one daughter Mrs. Keith Hastings, a son, and a brother Frank Sheppard, Toronto, also a number of near relatives and many friends in the village and community. The funeral which was held from Wright & Taylor's Funeral Home on Thursday afternoon, Jan. 24th, was largely attended and was conducted by Rev. T. E. Coulter, pastor of Richmond Hill United Church, and Dr. Sidney Smith, a former pastor. Interment followed in Richmond Hill Cemetery. The pallbearers were J. Lunau, J. R. Herrington, James McLean, T. ## Veterans' Pensions Have Attention of Col. Mulock M.P.

One of the first acts of Bill Mulock, North York's member of the House of Commons, on assuming his seat in Ottawa was to busy himself regarding the problem of pensions for the disabled soldiers many of which have been reduced or cancelled in recent years. Col. Mulock has placed on the order paper twelve questions which when answered by the government will give the public the true picture of pensions administration by the Bennett government since 1931.

The twelve questions on the order paper by Col. Mulock and now awaiting an answer from the administration are:

1. Have any ex-service men had their pensions discontinued in any of the following years, namely: (a) 1931, (b) 1932, (c) 1933, (d) 1934?
2. If so, how many pensions were discontinued in each of the said years?
3. What are the several reasons for the discontinuance of their pensions?
4. Have any ex-service men had their pensions reduced in any of the following years, namely: (a) 1931, (b) 1932, (c) 1933, (d) 1934?
5. If so, how many pensions were reduced in each of the said years?
6. What are the several reasons for the reduction of their pensions?
7. Have any ex-service men had their allowances under the War Veterans Allowance Act discontinued in the following years, namely: (a) 1931, (b) 1932, (c) 1933, (d) 1934?
8. If so, how many allowances have been discontinued in each of the said years?
9. What were the several reasons for the discontinuance of their allowances?
10. Have any ex-service men had their allowances under the War Veterans Allowance Act reduced in any of the following years, namely: (a) 1931, (b) 1932, (c) 1933, (d) 1934?
11. If so, how many have been reduced in each of the said years?
12. What were the several reasons for the reduction in their allowances?
