1/2 cup brown sugar, 1 cup shortening (half butter half lard), 1 egg, 1/2 cup corn syrup, 2 level teaspoons soda 14 cup hot water, 3 cups bread flour,

Cream shortening and sugar, add corn syrup, blend well. Add egg unbeaten, dissolve soda in hot water. Add flour, and mix in dough. Chill. Make in balls, put 2 inches apart in pan and mark with a fork. Bake in moderate oven. Put together with strawberry jam, if desired.
