Town To Build Tool House at Municipal Hall

Weather permitting, a certain amount of work will be carried on during the last couple of weeks of March on Richmond Hill streets. This was the decision of the members of council at the regular meeting Monday evening.

It was decided to start at once to make an outside entrance to the basement of the Municipal Buildings and that a section be fitted out suitable to house the tools of the municipality. It was also decided to make an inventory of all town tools and equipment and that all such tools be stamped in order to make identification easy.

Mrs. R. D. Little and Mrs. McGibbon waited on the council seeking the municipality's co-operation in providing milk to under-nourished children at the Public School. It was pointed out that at present a half pint of milk is supplied daily to about forty-five children.
