The World's First Scout Troupe

The first troupe of Boy Scouts was organized at Brownsea Island, England, in 1907, when Baden-Powell gathered together 24 boys for an experimental camp which was the forerunner of the great Boy Scout Movement of to-day.

British Scouts In Odd Corners Of The World

There are 67 groups of British Boy Scouts, totalling 2,594 members, scattered throughout 10 foreign countries. Eleven groups are in Buenos Aires, three in Rio de Janeiro, four in Sao Paulo, Brazil, one in Costa Rica, one in Antwerp, one in Brussels, eight in Shanghai, two in Tientsin, seven in Alexandria, Egypt, 18 in Cairo, five in France, two in Kobe, Japan, three in Switzerland and one in Spain.
