THANKS Editor, The Liberal, Sir— As a fitting climax to our local Jubilee Day Celebrations, I consider it only proper, that an acknowledgement should be made of the efforts of the large number of patriotic citizens, who contributed in many ways to the completion of the day's program and to whom credit is due for any success, that the general public may attribute to the day's activities. The celebrations in Richmond Hill were planned for the enjoyment of all our people in Richmond Hill and the surrounding district. In celebrating the completion of the twenty-five years reign of our sovereign King George V and his most gracious consort, Queen Mary, the committee wished to have as many participate in the activities as possible and in summarizing the events of our Jubilee Celebrations, it is very pleasing to note that nineteen different groups or organizations co-operated and that a total of over 650 persons, including children had an active part in the various activities. For this reason, it is inadvisable to consider naming all those who assisted the committee, but I will name those who assumed the most responsible duties. The parade, which consisted of over 600 children and adults reflects considerable credit on the Parade Committee under the leadership of the parade marshal, Mr. Robert Little. Special mention is due Mr. James Stewart for his very capable leadership as narrator and master-of-ceremonies and also to Mrs. Crockett for her splendid co-operation in providing the May-pole Dance with her children from the L.T.B. & O. Home. We appreciate the time, efforts and money expended by the matron, Mrs. Crockett in presenting the May-pole dance and we also thank Miss Jean Smith of the High School Staff for training the children. Miss Smith also deserves special mention for her direction and organization of the Empire Pageant, presented by the C.G.I.T. The splendid co-operation of the veterans of Vaughan Township and Richmond Hill resulted in a creditable war-time pageant. Mr. James Butler as author of this pageant deserves our thanks and for his untiring efforts throughout the day and in securing the York Townships Girls Band and in directing the Bugle Band, Mr. Butler merits probably as much credit as any member of our Jubilee Committee. Thus the Village with a population of about 1200 people was asked to celebrate such an event at a cost of 2c. for every child and adult. I am sure your committee sincerely hope, that the expectations of patriotic citizens were met in our local activities and that the general public will appreciate the efforts of the above mentioned ladies and gentlemen and also many others, not named,
