Baseball Notes

August Home Series At Maple Leaf Stadium Promises Action

Ike Boone's Lads In Thick Of Fight For Play-off Berth

The August home stand of the Toronto Baseball Club at the Maple Leaf Stadium on Fleet Street in Toronto will either make or break the Maple Leaf's chances of securing a berth in the International League play-off series that takes place immediately after the regular playing schedule.

Starting with Civic Holiday in Toronto on Monday, August 26th, when Syracuse opens with a double-header in the afternoon, games will be played most every night, especially Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday evenings throughout the month of August and during the first seven days of September.

Syracuse Chiefs, with an improved club and a fine pitching staff, opens the August Series with two games at the Fleet Street Stadium on Civic Holiday afternoon, Monday, August 5. A night game will be played with the Chiefs on Tuesday, August 6th. Single games are scheduled for Wednesday, August 7th, and another night contest on Thursday evening, August 8th.

Toronto and Baltimore staged a great series in Toronto during the July series with the Leafs winning three out of four games, one of these games went eleven innings under the floodlights before the Leafs were successful. Baltimore returns in August for a short three-game series packed into two days. The first contest with this pennant contending crew from the state of Maryland will be a night contest on Friday, August 9th, with two games billed as a double-header on Saturday afternoon August 10th.

Newark Bears follow Baltimore into the Maple Leaf Stadium with single games scheduled on Monday, August 12, Tuesday, August 13, both night contests. Wednesday, August 14, will most likely be a day game with the series concluding under the floodlights on Thursday, August 15th.

The Bears are a much better club than their showing this past month when they ran into a disastrous losing streak. They have always given the Leafs plenty of trouble and this August series will be a battle royal as the Newark crew are keen to avenge the four straight victories claimed by Toronto in their mid-summer meeting.

Those pesky Albany Senators, who seem to take the Leafs with the greatest of ease, yet they are unable to win against other clubs, battle Ike Boone and his lads with a night game on Friday, August 16, and make their departure for the current season with a double-header on Saturday afternoon.

Remaining scheduled home games include Buffalo Bisons at Maple Leaf Stadium on Thursday, August 29, Friday, August 30, night games and Saturday afternoon, August 31. Rochester Red Wings will be on hand for the Labor Day afternoon double-header on Monday, September 2, with night games following on Tuesday, September 3 and Wednesday, September 4. Montreal Royals, the team to beat for the pennant according to the experts, finish the local schedule at the Fleet Street Stadium with night games on Thursday, September 5 and Friday, September 6, and a double-header Saturday, September 7. From then on, it will be "off to the play-offs" and may the best team win.

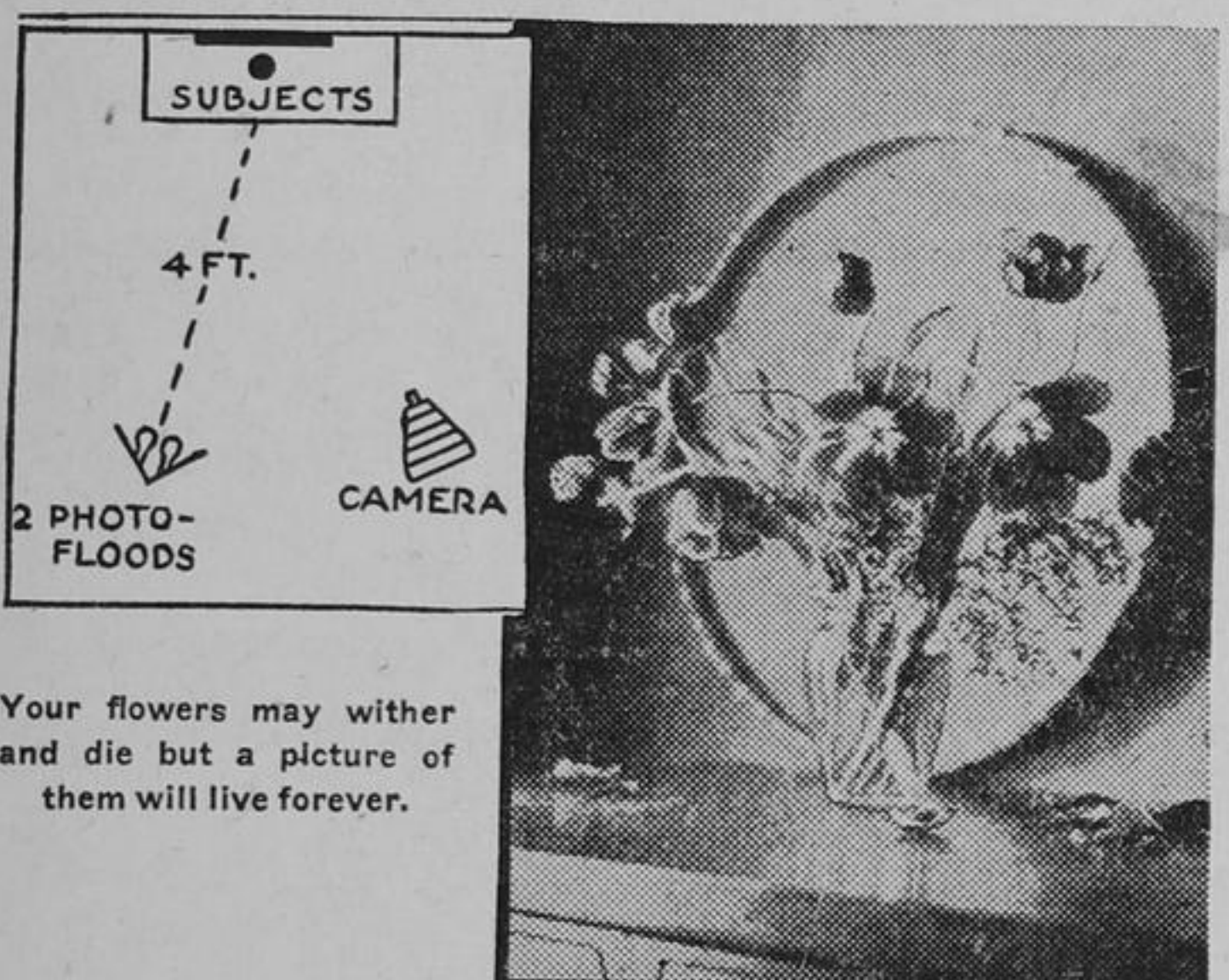

The SNAPSHOT GUILD FLOWER PICTURES



Your flowers may wither and die but a picture of them will live forever.

IT WOULD be quite unusual to find a mother, wife or home-maker who hasn't a potted plant, vase of artificial flowers or an object of art in the house that for one reason or another has become the "favorite." Flowers are much like friends. You no doubt like and respect all of the friends you associate with socially or you wouldn't seek their companionship nor accept their hospitality. There is invariably, however, one or two you like particularly well. There is something about them that appeals to you. Their very presence cheers you. It may be their personality, their manner of speech, their consideration of others, even their idiosyncrasies or many other things referred to and classified under the small but greatly publicized word—"It."

We can't say that flowers have "It." That's stretching things a little too far; but they do have a way of becoming a bright spot in our lives.

Why not keep a record of their growth and beauty with snapshots? You can take good pictures of flowers with any camera in the house or outdoors but today let's discuss pictures of flowers in the house.

Proper lighting is the foundation for good flower photography. It should be remembered that shadows are necessary to properly reproduce form in any graphic illustration. In outdoor photography natural lighting is depended upon so it is necessary to wait until the sunlight comes from the right direction to get the proper lighting for your subject. In this respect indoor picture taking has its advantages. You make and place your own lighting.

As a general rule, bright direct overhead light is not desirable so

the best results are obtained when lighting comes more from the sides so as to cast interesting, artistic shadows.

Successful flower photography has been made quite easy with the introduction of super sensitive panchromatic film. This film provides users of roll-film cameras with the advantages of extreme speed under artificial light and complete color sensitivity heretofore available only in cut film and plates. This film, sensitive to all colors, records the various color tones more in the variation of brightness as seen by the eye.

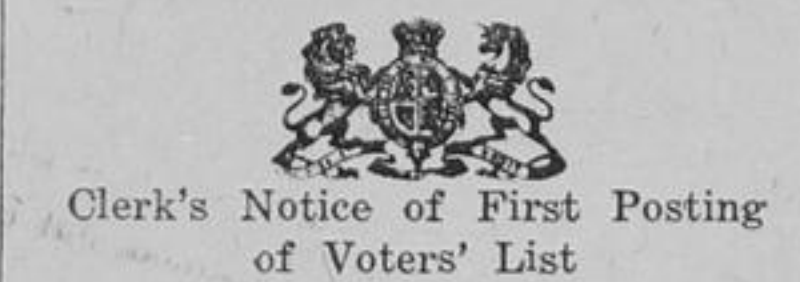
The diagram above shows how the picture to the right was taken. It is best not to place lights directly in front of the subject for in doing so you will generally fail to get depth in the picture. You will notice that the tray, used effectively as a background, is tilted against the wall and not flat against it. By tilting the tray the shadow to the right is made possible and adds greatly to the depth and attractiveness of the picture.

As shown in the diagram, you will need two photo-flood lamps placed in an ordinary floor lamp with the shade tilted slightly upward. If you cannot tilt the shade remove it entirely and hold a white cardboard, sheet or even a bright dishpan behind the lamps to serve as a reflector. You may want to do your own experimenting in the placing of the photo-flood lamps to get shadows that please you most.

After locating the subject in the finder set the diaphragm at f.6.3 and the shutter speed at 1/25 of a second and take your picture.

Your flowers may wither and die but the picture will live forever.
