- Blueberry Cottage Pudding -

1/4 cup butter or shortening, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 egg, 1/2 cup milk, 11/2 cups flour, 21/2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 cup raw blueberries, lightly floured.

Cream the butter or shortening until fluffy. Blend in sugar, add warm with lemon sauce.

- Lemon Sauce -

1/3 cup sugar, 11/2 tablespoons corn starch, few grains of salt, 1 cup boiling water, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind, 2 teaspoons butter.

Combine sugar, corn starch and salt thoroughly. Gradually stir in boiling water and stir until smoothly thickened and no flavor or raw starch remains. Keep hot over hot water and at serving time add lemon juice, rind and butter.
