### FORTY YEARS AGO

From Our Issue of Dec. 19th, 1895

We are sure our readers will be glad to notice that Mr. Wm. Cook, barrister, of Toronto, has opened an office at Maple, where he can be consulted on Thursday afternoon.

The Provincial Government a few days ago reported that they could not confirm the by-law passed by the County Council throwing the maintenance of the York roads on to the local municipalities. This decision, which we consider a just one, was received with much satisfaction by the residents of this section of country.

On Saturday morning Mr. George Chauncey, for the past ten years postmaster at Newmarket died at his residence in that village, at the age of 47. He was a native of Newfoundland, and came to Canada 22 years ago. Several years before receiving the appointment of postmaster he owned and edited The Markham Sun.

The following members of the Board of Education were present at the monthly meeting on Monday Messrs. Glass, Newton, Switzer, Palmer, McConaghy, Boyle, Naughton Trench. Inspector Davison's report of official visit to the Public School on November 18th and 19th was read. He expressed his pleasure in reporting that teachers and pupils in every department were working harmoniously and intelligently. A tender for wood was read from John Hadwen for 40 cords at \$3.80. Accounts were read and ordered paid and the Board adjourned.

### THIRTY YEARS AGO

From Our Issue of Dec. 14th, 1905

Aurora is to vote on a by-law to raise \$10,000 to improve the waterworks system in that town.

Mr. P. G. Savage, the present Reeve, will not be a candidate for municipal honors next year. He made this announcement about a year ago and he has not since changed his mind. Mr. Savage has done faithful work as a member of the Council for 25 years in succession, and it is only reasonable that he desires a rest.

Ross, East Toronto; Joshua Harrison, York Mills; Alex. Bruce, Gormley; Dr. Robinson, Markham; C. R. Fitch, Stouffville; Secretary-Treasurer, R. A. Stiver, Unionville; Auditors, W. H. Grant and L. E. Annis.

### Local Option in Vaughan

A meeting of what perhaps might be called the "Central Committee" for Local Option in Vaughan Township was held on Monday afternoon at Vellore for the purpose of making arrangements for the vote on election day. Many of the leading voters of the Township were present and sub-committees were appointed for each polling division. The committee appeared quite sanguine of success.

Charles Robinson of Woodbridge, while out shooting in Johnston's bush Monday morning, slipped and fell, causing the gun to discharge, shooting off his left hand. A couple of men working in a gravel pit close by ran to his assistance and took him to Woodbridge where a doctor was summoned.

### Work of Mercy carried on by Voluntary Contributions

There is not one from whom the whole cost of maintenance is received. This work of mercy could never have been carried on without public support. This year, a falling off in hospital income from provincial and municipal grants, and a decrease in voluntary contributions, have increased the problem of maintaining the three hospitals.
