### HIGHWAY DEPARTMENTS TACKLE ICY ROADS

Tackling the problem of icy pavements which early this winter kept the hospitals busy patching up minor hurts, the garages and repair shops busy taking out the dents in fenders and changing smashed wheels, and which caused innumerable delays to traffic and bus and truck schedules, the Highway Department at Queen's Park, Toronto, has now built up an organization that enables it to sand 3,000 miles of highway within three hours after the need arises. This represents not only a marvelous feat in getting the work accomplished in the time stated but it is also a step that has not yet been thought of as practical in the United States where we have a tendency to look for precedence and leadership in highway matters.

Fast trucks, mechanical spreaders and a smooth organization directed by wide-awake engineers have made this method of spreading the abrasive an accomplished fact.

The costs were at first prohibitive, but as the problem was studied, new means were devised and the costs came down.

The materials used for the abrasive are sand, cinders and stone chips. Lumps are broken up or eliminated to ensure a smooth flow through the spreaders. Common salt is used in an admixture to keep the sand piles from freezing as they must be available in coldest weather for immediate use. The salt also allows the abrasive to embed itself in the icy surface, thus preventing wind and traffic cleaning the surface in short order.

By treating in this manner, the material is held on the pavement, not only providing traction but at the same time tending to tear off the ice and thereby expose the bare pavement.

The department at Queen's Park has the stock piles of the mixture spread at convenient points where they are available in all weathers.

Trucks are speedily loaded, mechanical spreaders attached, and with a couple of men shovelling grit into the spreader the road surface is quickly covered with a thin layer of the abrasive. Piles have been so located that one truck can cover several miles of highway or street without the necessity of losing time through running empty over the route.

The department engineers report a wider usage of the roads and a decrease in the number of accidents.
