sugar, 2 eggs well beaten, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 cup moist cocoanut powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon er of Woodbridge. cinnamon, 1 cup rolled oats.

Cream butter, add sugar gradually, add eggs, vainlla, cocoanut, orange juice and rind, then add sifted dry ingredients and rolled oats. Mix well Drop from teaspoon on buttered baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees F) for 10 to 12 minutes. To chill the batter before bak-
