A FAVORITE TESTED RECIPE Coconut Orange Cookies

1/2 cup butter, 1 cup granulated sugar, 2 eggs well beaten, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 cup moist cocoanut, 4 tablespoons orange juice, 2 tablespoons grated orange rind, 1 1/4 cups pastry flour, 3/4 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 cup rolled oats.

Cream butter, add sugar gradually, add eggs, vanilla, cocoanut, orange juice and rind, then add sifted dry ingredients and rolled oats. Mix well. Drop from teaspoon on buttered baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees F) for 10 to 12 minutes. To chill the batter before baking improves the flavor.

N.B.—In the recipe for Banana Muffins given recently, it should have read 1/4 melted shortening, these words being omitted.
