WAY BACK IN LIBERAL FILES

FORTY YEARS AGO
From our Issue of May 14th, 1896

12th, Rev. J. Vickery, Superintendent
of the Circuit, in the chair. The finan-
cial report for the year 1895-96
was presented by the auditors, read,
adopted, ordered to be printed and
circulated among the members of the
congregation. The election of officers
for the ensuing year was as follows:
Secretary, Wm. Harrison; Treasurer,
J. A. E. Switzer; Pew Steward,
Wm. Harrison; Ushers, Thos. Trench
and Jas. Wright; Collectors, Messrs.
Savage, Glass, Crosby, Sanderson,
Hopper, Hicks, and Storey; Envelope
Committee, W. A. Sanderson, C. Mason
and J. H. Sanderson; Auditors, Messrs.
I. Crosby and R. E. Law; Organist,
Mrs. A. J. Hume; Assistant, Austin Law;
Committee of Management, Messrs. John
Sanderson, P. G. Savage and J. A. E.
Switzer. The church bell to be rented
as formerly for village purposes.

The directors of the Agricultural

announced to give exhibitions in
front of the grand stand in the
afternoon, Prof. Bondo has been added,

THIRTY YEARS AGO
From our Issue of May 10th, 1906
We regret to have to record this
week the sudden death of Mr. H.
Winch, a respectable citizen here for
the past few years. Service was con-
ducted at the house Wednesday morn-
ing after which the remains were
taken to Queensville and interred in
the family plot. He leaves to mourn
his loss a widow, two sons and a

hill.

produce, which has been a feature

ket in the town hall.
