On their return they will reside in Unionville.

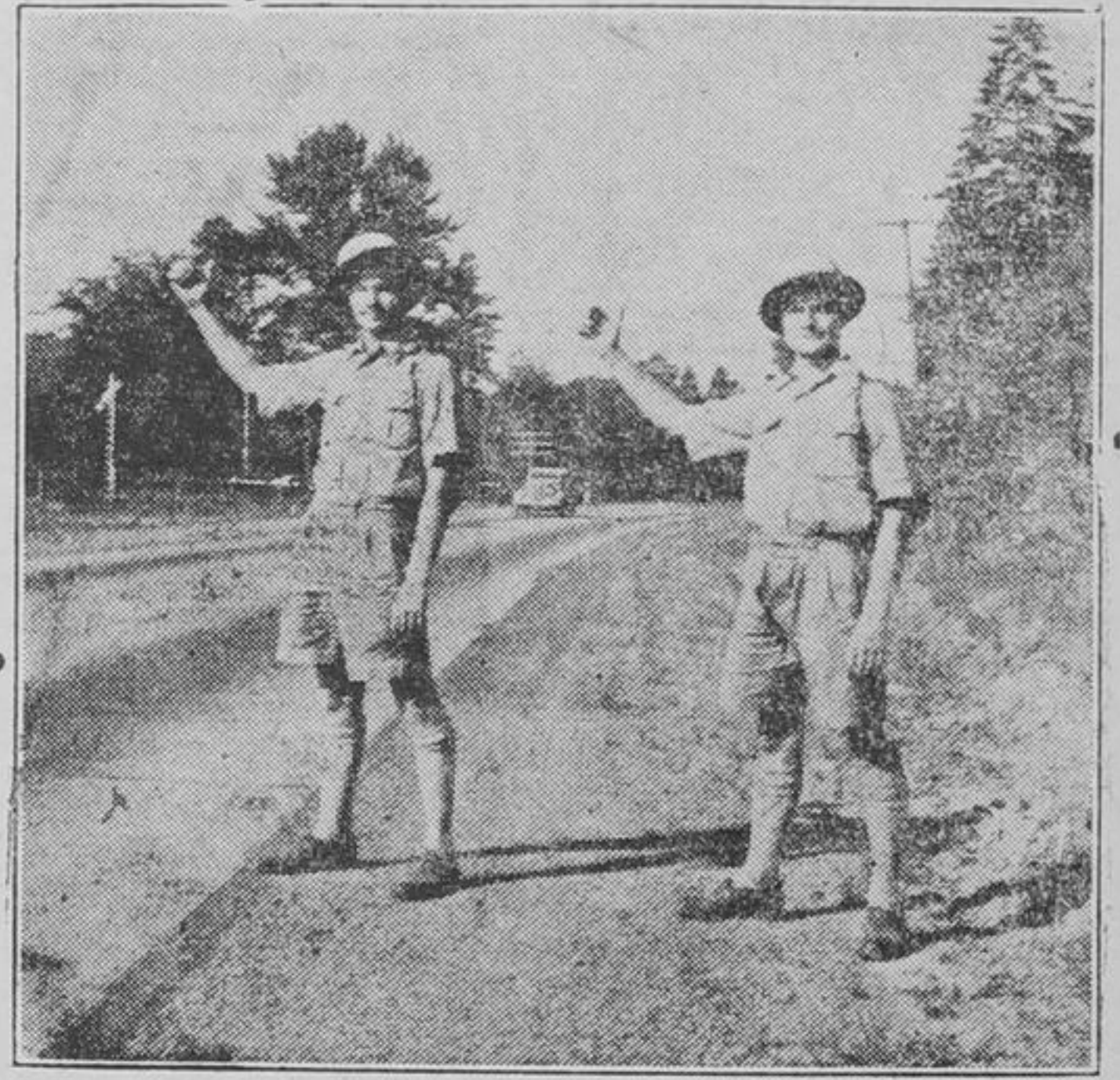
MORRIS-CASELEY
