WORKMAN KILLED ON YONGE STREET

Toby Thompson, married, of Holland Landing, employed by the Department of Public Highways, was instantly killed Wednesday afternoon when struck by a car driven by Alex. Gavard, St. Catharines, some distance south of Richmond Hill on Yonge Street.

Thompson at the time of the accident was operating a machine which is used to set white lines on the centre of the pavement, and the car was proceeding southward at the time, Gavard being on his way to Toronto from North Bay. Coroner Dr. J. P. Wilson, who was notified, had the body removed to Wright and Taylor's Funeral Parlors, and an inquest was ordered.

Gavard was taken to the Jail Farm on a charge of manslaughter, with bail set at \$5,000.

S. Cook, Holland Landing, who was assisting Thompson, suffered leg injuries and was treated by Dr. L. R. Marwood, Thornhill. Provincial Officer Gilbert Robertson investigated.

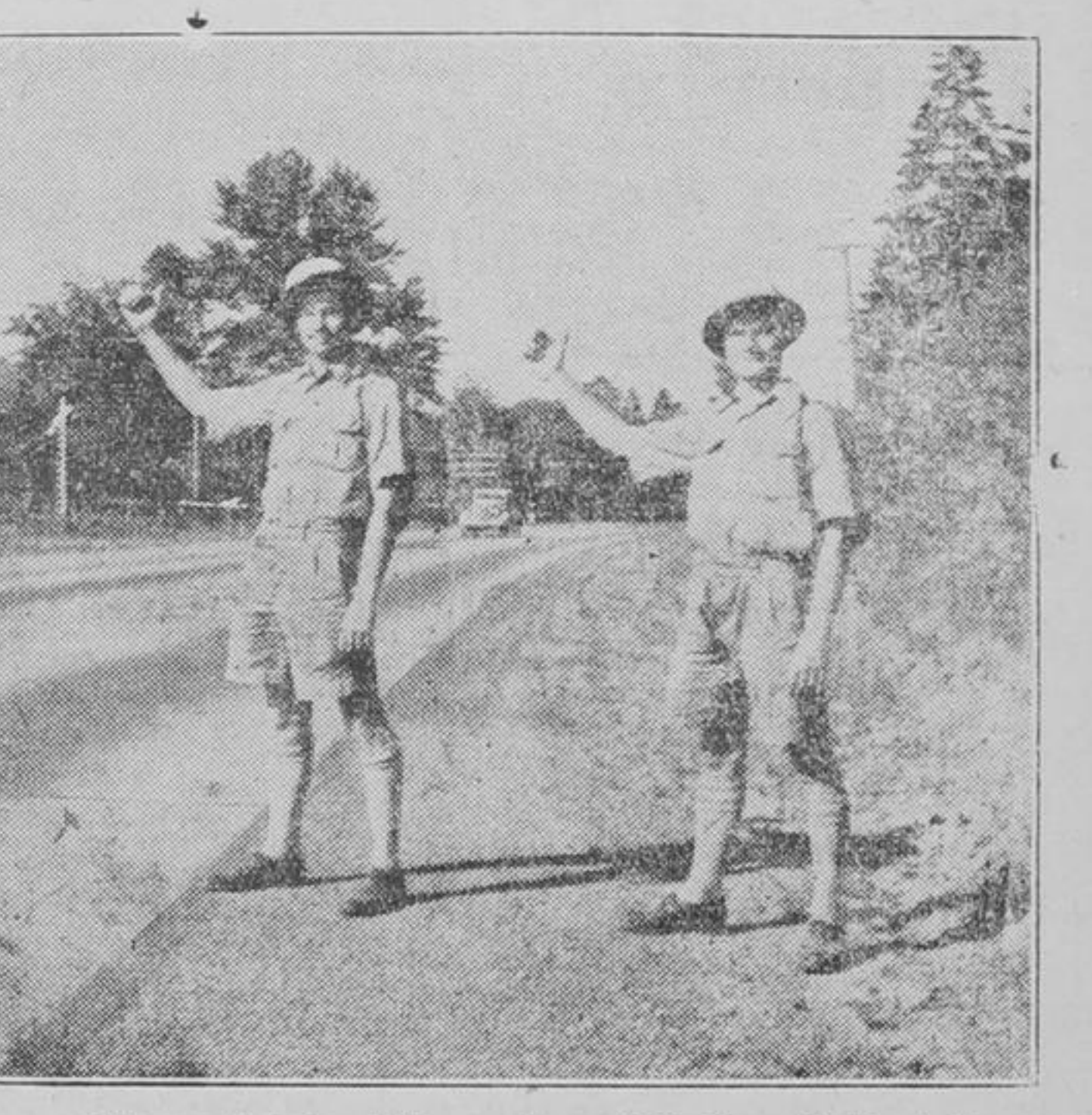
