A number of dams up the stream were discovered and destroyed this week and the sup-

The majority of citizens have cooperated in refraining from using hose for gardens but there are reports that some have disregarded the order. Reeve Greene emphasized the fact that it is most important that the order continue as if there should be a fire and the water supply insufficient it might be a very serious matter. He intimated that a check up would be made and any who violated the regulations governing use of hose would be prosecuted.
