A Favorite Tested Recipe
Deep Cherry and Rhubarb Pie
2 cups pitted cherries, 2 cups diced rhubarb, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 cup granulated sugar 1/2 tablespoon butter. Pastry.

Combine two fruits. Combine flour and sugar. Add two mixtures together and blend well. Place in baking dish. Dot with pieces of butter. Cover with uncooked pastry to fit pan. Bake in hot oven for 10 minutes, reduce heat and complete cooking. Serve warm with cream. More sugar may be added if desired.

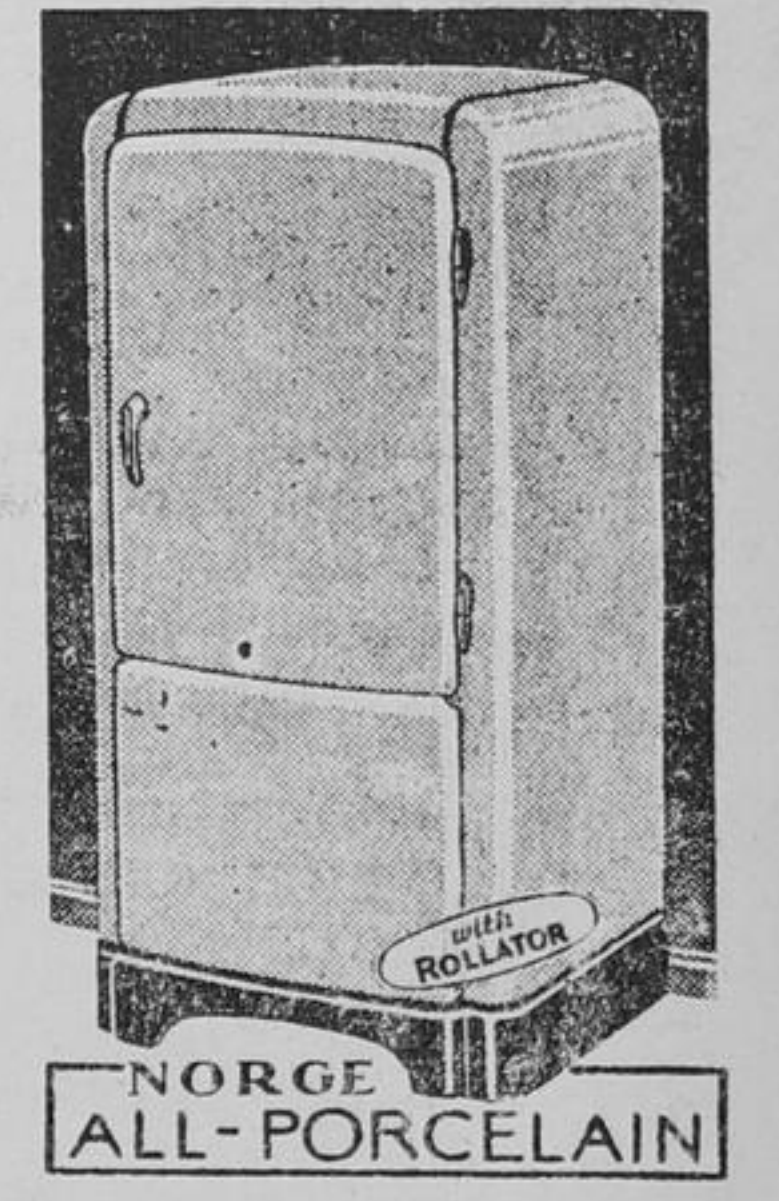
MISS SHIELA BERESFORD APPOINTED TO SCHOOL STAFF

POTATO YIELD HITS LOW LEVEL GROWERS SAY
Ontario's potato crop will be "the poorest in 12 years," said J. T. Cassin, president of the Ontario Potato Growers' Association, last week. Late spring frosts and the current froth are blamed for this. "The crop, which was promising four weeks ago, is now being harvested, and a 50 per cent. crop is being realized," he said. "In some districts not more than one-third of the crop will be harvested. Immediate rains would benefit some of the districts, while other sections are practically past any further development. Much of the vegetable crop in southern Ontario is in grave danger of being destroyed.

RICHVALE SOCIAL CLUB MEETING AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

The regular meeting of Richvale Social Club was held on Thursday, July 2nd. The election of officers also took place with the following result: President, J. P. Sparkes (re-elected); Vice-President, John Johnston (re-elected); Recording-Secretary, Mrs. G. Masters; Treasurer, Mrs. J. P. Sparkes (re-elected). Reports submitted showed that over eight hundred dollars had been handled by the Association the past year, the profits of which were spent on bereavements, sickness, picnic for 250 children, and 108 families supplied with baskets at Christmas, leaving a balance of \$33.39 cash in bank and about \$50.00 in assets.
